J. H. FAULK - Ours is a struggle of humanity and inhumanity. Justice is injustice. This writer JAMES BALDWIN feels this. He thinks this. He writes this. JAMES BALDWIN:

The freedom march in August, 1963, of 250,000 wanted a redress of grievances. These people wanted to tell this country of their troubles and tell of the trouble of our country. He described his emotion of feeling a prisoner upon hearing of the death of a friend, MEDGER EVERS. He described his feeling when 4 children were killed. He traced the philosophy of the "Myth of Northern Europe" upon coming to America -

A. Killing the Indians B. Enslaving the Negro

Having done these things we cannot deny it - we must admit these crimes. America today is trapped in a feeling of nostalgia and pain. The so-called left and right elements are based on frames of reference which have now vanished.

The warnings of the press to the Negro movement concerning infiltration of Communist members, the warning of FBI J. EDGAR HOOVER, etc. These warnings fall on jaundiced ears.

BALDWIN cannot comprehend how Russia or Red China would gain by involvement in the Negro situation in depression days - Moscow may have seemed like a holy city. The attempt to unite black and white workers in union. The Harlem Negro had been promised by Republicans and Democrats for years. The promises of the C.P. fell on unreceptive ears. The C.P. promised too much.

J. EDGAR HOOVER has said - "Devotion to race should not supersed to established institution". BALDWIN is not sure what is meant by race. He thinks he might know what devotion means but he does definitely know what established institution means.

STANK WITH

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As a Negro - freedom can be saved by attacking the following:

- 1. L. PEREZ (La.) 2. Senator EASTLAND
 3. Trade Union System which places negroes at the bottom of the barrel?
- 4. Christian churches because they have never accepted the Negroes
 - 5. The Republican Party with its GOLDWATER.
 - 6. The Democratic Party with its EASTLAND.

We must attack these institutions - we do not mean we have to go to Moscow or Peking for help.

It is significant that our government is concerned about citizens going to Cuba, particularly Negroes going to Cuba. Are we not mature enough to know what we are doing? Are we such poor risks to expose us to anything outside America?

If he had a choice to take his family on a vacation would he go to Havana or Miami? He would choose Havana not because he is a communist or a Castroite. He would choose it because he could stay at any hotel he wanted. His children could take a "leak" in any bathroom. Not one that was segregated.

We in America cannot pretend to be the leader of the free world. The world is smaller today. It listens to speeches by L. PERES. Any citizen should be old enough, mature enough to go anywhere in the world and come back and report on what he saw - Are we so abject that we cannot be corrupted? Are we not safer to know what is going on in Cuba, China, Vietnam?

THINKE

He has written articles that were rejected because the magazine editors said:

"This is not for our readers."

The mass media of the press has a responsibility of dissemination of information and truth.

Freedom is a slogan. We in America are free only as we dare to be. People must protect freedom. When government tells us what to read, what to believe or with whom we may associate then that government is in great trouble.

Concerning dictators - our government doesn't disapprove of all of them, only those it cannot deal with. We back a status quo and neglect to face the inevitable revolution which is already in progress.

All works of art are flawed. There are limitations to our abilities so we cannot achieve our conceived perfection - We are human. We are limited by a world outside ourselves and a world inside ourselves.

There is a flaw in our country. We are not a country as such yet. We are trapped in a collection of motels and boyscouts.

We deny our history to curselves. We are still dominated by the "Myth of Europe". History books portray the American Negro as a canable with a bone in his nose. This is not true. Otherwise why would America be conscious of the Negro movement.

BALDWIN says: "I have never been afraid of Russia, China or Cuba but I am terrified of this country." Apathy allows thousands of people in the deep south to perish - not only Negroes, the real victim is the poor white man, who does these things because he was told generations ago to do it. He could never allow himself to fall below the level of the Negro.

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Who has divorced these white men from the reality? A handfull of men on the hill and some even on Capitol Hill who have determined not to share the wealth.

We could be a soverign people. We must assess our history. PERES, EASTLAND are not an act of God. We accept them because we are afraid to face the facts of our lives."

The real responsibility begins in the attitude of the people toward their own private lives.

In the richer countries of the world - Switzerland, Germany, England and America we find them the most inhuman. The poorer countries Spain & Italy they are more human.

The only way to survive this crisis is to accept this fact that this is not a white country. There are twenty million Negroes of all degrees & shades. It is a <u>dillusion</u> to think oneself as a white.

Remember in slave quarters it was not the Negro grandmothers who raped the owners.

There are millions of dollars spent each year to prepare for war which no one can survive. This is wasteful and could be used for most fruitful purposes.

Because it is Christmas let us remember that He attacked institutions; He was a revolutionary - He changed the world.

We can do that, we have the money we have the experience. We still have the hope to find the facts of our lives.

The Negro movement is complimented for its peaceful demonstrations. BALDWIN is against all forms of violence & shedding of blood.





- "5) The Chairman informed the Board that the State Un-American Activities Committee's report for 1963 has been published and again designates CCPAF as a communist front. A communication will be sent to Senator BRUNS calling his attention to the many mis-statements of fact pertaining to CCPAF in this report.
- "6) The Secretary reported that the NCAHUAC National Committee meeting will be held March 7 and 8 in Washington, D.C. The Secretary and Chairman will attend the meeting, and if possible, one more delegate from CCPAF will attend. Delegates will arrive in order to visit Congressmen.

After the Congressional vote on the HUAC appropriation, a campaign in detail will be planned during the following 10 months before the opening of Congress in 1965 to rally support against the HUAC.

Agenda for the National meeting in March will be discussed at the next CCPAF Board meeting in February.

"7) A report from the Secretary on political action recommended that CCPAF Board members take an active part in the candidacy of Assemblyman PHIL BURTON of San Francisco, for Congress.

BURTON's election would insure progressive leadership in Congress and strong support for Abolition.

A letter dated November 12, 1963, from JOHN HENRIK CLARKE, Associate Editor of "Freedomways", addressed to Dr. MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR., at the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, 334 Auburn Avenue, Northeast, Atlanta, In this letter, CLARKE states that the Fall issue of "Freedomways" had been mailed to KING and that he hoped KING had had time to read the Summer issue. CLARKE added that the Winter issue, which they are now preparing would be devoted to the Southern freedom movement and they would like to have most of the articles for the issue written by people who have either participated or are still in the movement. He said they were asking the heads of all major organizations in the South to write a short statement explaining the nature of their organization's involvement in the Southern freedom movement. He said that these statements would be published in the Winter issue and that "Freedomways" was anxious to have KING's thoughts on the matter as early as possible.

PETRIE of Company B, Second Medical Battalion, Second Infantry Division, Fort Benning, Georgia, addressed to Freedomways Associates, 799 Broadway, New York, New York. In this letter, PETRIE asked that he be informed when his subscription to "Freedomways" would end, adding that he wanted another one started. He also said that his brother, WILLIAM PRYOR, 600 North 5th St., Nashville, Tennessee, had not received the last two issues of the magazine and that his subscription began the same time as did PETRIE's. PETRIE also said that he was a Southerner, and knowing that the next issue would be an all-Southern issue, had enclosed with this letter 9 vignettes relating to his childhood in Tennessee for possible use in the publication.
- 3. A letter dated December 30, 1963, addressed to IVANHOE DONALDSON, in care of the Student Non-Violent Co-Ordinating Committee (SNCC), 6 Raymond St., NW, Atlanta, Georgia. This letter was from JOHN HENRIK CLARKE, the Associate Editor of "Freedomways", and he thanked DONALDSON for calling his home to inquire about the type of material they need for the next issue of the magazine, which would be devoted to the Southern freedom movement. He also said that he had received an article from DONALDSON, which he would read and pass on to other members of the staff.
- 4. A letter dated August 22, 1963, from M. KATHERINE BAKER, Annapolis, Maryland, addressed to Freedomways Associates, stating that she would like a copy of the latest edition: of the magazine for review purposes because a study group to which she belongs is interested in the publication.
- 5. A letter dated November 27, 1963, from JOHN CLARKE addressed to STERLING STUCKEY, 919 East 61st Street, Chicago, Illinois, stating that he hoped STUCKEY had received the 75 copies of the current issue of "Freedomways". He said that he felt that STUCKEY would be proud to be associated with the coming issue and added that he, CLARKE, had been asked to assemble and edit a special issue of "Presence Africaine" devoted to "The Black Revolution in America". He said that he would expect a contribution from STUCKEY.

He also expressed appreciation that she might write an article on the Southern Conference Educational Fund (SCEF) raid and attempts to destroy intergration organizations in the South.

9. A letter dated October 16, 1963, on the stationery of the Department of Social Studies, Central High School, Newark, New Jersey, from JUSTIN B. GALFORD, Chairman, addressed to Freedomways, NYC. He said he was interested on Harlem and information on subscription costs.

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CLARKE addressed to GEORGE SINGLETON, Editor of "The A.M.E. Church Review", Philadelphia, Pa., stating that he, CLARKE, had received SINGLETON's letter of December 16, and the 5 copies of the "Church Review". CLARKE added that the letter to WILLIAM PATTERSON was incorrectly addressed, that PATTERSON lives & 1268 President St., Brooklyn, NY. He said that he had spoken to PATTERSON and sent the letter to him, adding that both of them were proud to have their work published in the "Church Review."

10th Annual Bill of Rights Dinner December 13, 1963 Americana Hotel Grand Imperial Ballroom

The following is a description of people seen at this meeting:

at Table 101 with a group of other doctors and wives.

Dr. MEYER ROSENBERG, who is a neurosurgeon, attending at Jewish Hospital of Brooklyn, was seen coming out of the men's room. He is 5'7", 190 pounds, suntanned, balding, with light hair.

Miss SUE YELLIN was seen moving from table to table and speaking with guests. Miss YELLIN is the Assistant Chief Medical Technician at the Metropolitan Diagnostic Institute at 2 Nevins Street in Brooklyn. She is 5'7", 120 pounds, long black kinky hair, large brown eyes, of a very pale complexion and quite thin. Also seen leaving the affair going down the stairs to the ground floor of the Americana Hotel was a member of the Medical Committee for Civil Rights, in fact, one of the speakers who represented the Medical Committee for Civil Rights at the March on Washington. This doctor is 5'8", thin, dark hair, dark mustache, wears glasses. He is, I bedieve, mentioned by name in my previous report on the March on Washington.

Mentioned as contributing a substantial sum and mentioned as present in the audience was Dr. ALEXANDER KATZ of Brooklyn.

The meeting was chaired by JOHN HENRY FALK and several references were made to his recent successful libel suit. Mr. FALK made many comments on the current American foreign policy and was seemingly opposed to America's Viet Nam and Cuban policy.

The first featured speaker was Mrs. CYRUS EATON. Mrs. EATON launched an attack on the press in general on the use of the entertainment and advertising media as an instrument of setting forth the policies of the American power structure. She attacked capitalism and charged that the government hired many of the demonstrators who recently demonstrated against visiting Eastern European diplomats and visitors.

The recipient of the Thomas Paine Award was Mr. BOBBY DILLON, the noted song writer. Mr. DILLON wore a dark shirt without a tie and corduroy-type jacket and pants as did many younger people in the audience. When the award was presented, Mr. DILLON was missing from the dias. After approximately seven or eight minutes, he was found and brought for the acceptance. His acceptance speech was a rambling, almost incoherent talk. He spoke of his great, admiration for the student group that had gone to Cuba (as did almost all the other speakers). He expressed the fact that it was too bad that all of the people in the audience were not young. He commented on LEE OSWALD, stating something to this effect: "I see a lot of myself in LEE OSWALD. I don't mean I would go so far as to shoot anyone." At this point the audience, which had been growing restless, began to hiss and boo and they yelled, "No." Mr. DILLON tried to gracefully back out of this faux-pas. This statement created a tremendous stir for the rest of the evening and many of the following speakers commented on Mr. DILLON's speech and also attempted to interpret it.

Another speaker was a Mr. BIDERMAN, who was identified as one of the Hollywood Eleven. His was a speech which involved the collection of funds through the audience. He also introduced the rest of the guests on the dias and told each of their stories. Their problems were described as a type of fight that the Emergency Civil Liberties Committee is carrying on. Among the people introduced was the leader of the young student group that went to Cuba recently against the wishes of the government. Also introduced was a member of the Lincoln Brigade, and many others.

Mr. CORLISS LAMONT was also present and made a brief statement.

The final speaker of the evening was JAMES BALDWIN. His speech consisted of a vigorous description of his theories on the meaning of Negro subjugation and its damaging effect on the entire American community. His speech was extremely well received. He made the statement that he was not very interested in Mr. J. EDGAR HOOVER's recommendation that the Negro in his quest for equality should not fight established institutions. It was Mr. BALDWIN's premise that these established institutions have offered the Negro no real help and have in fact tended to maintain his lowly state. He mentioned that the ban on travel to Cuba was quite incomprehensible to him since as a Negro he was better off vacationing in Havana than in Miami Beach no matter what the type of system was in effect in Cuba. He advocated unlimited issuance of passports to everyone to go anywhere. He stated that he and many other Negro leaders were well aware that the Communists offered no solution to the Negro problem and that this was quite obvious since they promised much but all Negroes knew that it was impossible to fulfill these promises.

The speakers claimed that there were 1,500 people in the ballroom. The ballroom was filled with round tables which seated approximately 10 people each, and the entire floor of the ballroom was covered with tables. There did not seem to be many empty seats.

The formal part of the meeting began approximately at 8:30 and ended at approximately 11:00 p.m.

There were several announcements of large donations; a rough guess of the total donations is \$12,000. This included a large gift by CORLISS LAMONT. There were also many similar donations mentioned. There was a donation from a Theatre Union which was said to be present.

A characterization of Freedomways Associates, incorporated, publishers of the magazine "Freedomways", is attached to this memorandum.

On February 9, 1964, a confidential source furnished information reflecting that Freedomways Associates, Incorporated, on January 31, 1964, paid the Creeden Company \$35.29 for stenciling envelopes.

This same source, on February 9, 1964, furnished information reflecting that Freedomways Associates was preparing a mailing of a printed letter from James Baldwin praising "Freedomways" magazine for its articles on the civil rights crisis and stating that he was renewing his subscription for two years. This letter which is addressed "Dear Friend", contains the printed signature of James Baldwin and asks the recipient to join him in subscribing to "Freedomways" at once.

The source was unable to advise whether the envelopes stenciled by the Creeden Company were used for the mailing of the Baldwin letter.

James Baldwin is a well known Negro author.

FREEDOMWAYS ASSOCIATES, INC.

The records of the New York Secretary of State, Albany, New York, show that the certificate of incorporation of Freedomways Associates, Incorporated, was filed on March 2, 1961.

The Spring, 1963, issue of "Freedomways" is self-described as "A Quarterly Review of the Negro Freedom Movement" published by Freedomways Associates, Incorporated, 799 Broadway, New York City.

On May 24, 1961, a source advised that a report was given on "Freedomways" at a meeting of the National Board, Communist Party, USA (CPUSA), held on May 24, 1961. It was stated that the original plan called for the publication to be openly Marxist, but that it was later decided it would not be avowedly a Marxist publication. Editorials are in the hands of a mixed group of Marxists and non-Marxists. It was stated that the central purpose of "Freedomways" is to develop a theory and positive criticism of currents in the Negro movement, as well as to raise the level of understanding and discussion taking place in Negro life today and to project a socialist and pro-Soviet orientation.

On May 25, 1961, another source advised that "Freedomways" was set up for the CPUSA by James Jackson, a member of the National Committee of the CPUSA.
