

at the Seventh General Convention of the IWO (June, 1947) LOUISE THOMPSON PATTERSON of Chicago was elected vice president and was also elected on June 18, 1947, to the Executive Committee of the newly elected General Council.

The "Daily Worker" issue of June 19, 1947, page eight, column three, states that at the Seventh Annual Convention of the IWO, LOUISE PATTERSON was elected vice president for the coming year.

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advised on August 18, 1947, that on August 5, 1947, the Du Sable Lodge of the IWO in Chicago, held a meeting which had been called by LOUISE PATTERSON. This informant advised that LOUISE PATTERSON indicated that the meeting had been held for the purpose of working out a program to encourage the labor unions in Chicago, to use the Du Sable Center for their meetings.

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The informant advised that it had been announced at the meeting by PATTERSON, that \$27,000.00 had been raised to help pay for the mortgage on a Du Sable Center. advised in 1946, that as of November, 1946, the subject was President of the Mid-west Council of the IWO in Chicago, Illinois, and continues in her post as National Vice President of the IWO.

also advised that the subject is Executive Secretary of the Du Sable Lodge Number 751, and that the Du Sable Lodge has the largest membership of any IWO Lodge in the United States.

advised in 1944, that as of July 22, 1944, the subject was serving as Mid-west District President and National Vice President of the IWO.

The "Daily Worker" of May 30, 1943, in an item datelined at Chicago, indicated that LOUISE THOMPSON, President of the Chicago District of the IWO, endorsed the "Daily Worker" as the "best friend of national groups in America". She was reported as having stated, "We of the IWO, welcome the opportunity to support the 'Daily Worker' because it is the only daily English speaking paper whose columns are always open to the IWO, and call upon all our members to give it full support as a further contribution on their part to winning the war".

advised on March 30, 1943, that the subject is the National Vice President of the IWO.

According to the 'Daily Worker' of June 30, 1940, the subject was elected Vice President of the IWO.





advised prior to January 29, 1941, that the subject was National Recording Secretary of the IWO from 1938 to 1940.

The November 20, 1939 issue of the "Daily Worker", in an article captioned "IWO Leader to Tour East and Mid-west", identifies the subject as National Secretary of the English Section of the IWO. The article further states that her work for the IWO began towards the end of 1933, and a year later she went to Birmingham, Alabama, as an IWO organizer, and was "Arrested for attempting to set up lodges among Negroes"; and in 1935, she was elected National Recording Secretary of the IWO.

The August 11, 1937, issue of the "Daily Worker" contains an article captioned, "Negro IWO Leader Sails for Paris Today to Attend Parley on Racial Problems". This article identifies THOMPSON, as National Secretary of the English Section of the IWO, and states that she will be an official delegate in the IWO, and will also represent the National Negro Congress.

who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on February 15, 1954, that the "Steering Committee" of the Civil Rights Congress was officially established at a meeting held on December 9, 1954, at the Office of the Civil Rights Congress, 6 East 17th Street, New York City, and that it was announced at this meeting that the subject would address meetings of the Civil Rights Congress in January, 1955, in Philadelphia, Newark, and other cities to raise funds for the defense of her husband, WILLIAM L. PATTERSON.

advised on September 14, 1955, that WILLIAM L. PATTERSON was, at that time, Executive Secretary of the Civil Rights Congress, and known to the informant as a Communist.

WILLIAM L. PATTERSON, on July 1, 1954, was confined to the Federal House of Detention, 427 West Street, New York City, and was subsequently transferred on July 9, 1954, to the Federal Correctional Institution at Danbury, Connecticut, from which institution he was released on





September 28, 1954, after serving a ninety day sentence for contempt. advised on January 25, 1955, that a meeting of the Civil Rights Congress "Steering Committee" took place on January 24, 1955, at Civil Rights Congress Headquarters, 6 East 17th Street, New York City, and that the subject was present. Plans for a Civil Rights Congress mass meeting for January 26, 1955, were discussed at this meeting. who has furnished reliable information in the past, both advised on January 31, 1955, that the Civil Rights Congress mass rally to "Free WILLIAM L. b2 PATTERSON and BENJAMIN DAVIS", was held as scheduled on b7D January 26, 1955 at the Yugoslav-American Home, and the subject was one of the speakers. who has furnished reliable information in the past furnished the same information on January 27, 1955, as the above.

BENJAMIN J. DAVIS, JR., was one of the 11 members of the National Committee of the CP, who was convicted on October 14, 1949, in the United States District Court, Southern District of New York, for violation of the Smith Act of 1940.

The "Daily Worker" issue of January 28, 1955, page 6, column 3, in an article captioned, "400 at Rally Urge Release of PATTERSON and DAVIS", which related that "More than 400 men and women attended the above mentioned rally Wednesday night in the Yugoslav-American Home, to protest the continued imprisonment of WILLIAM L. PATTERSON, Executive Secretary of the Civil Rights Congress, and the former City Councilman BENJAMIN J. DAVIS". The article revealed that the subject was one of the speakers at the rally.

advised on December 20, 1954, that the subject attended a dinner honoring the 30th anniversary of International Publishers and the 70th birthday of



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ALEXANDER TRACEMBERG, held at the Yugoslav-American Home on December 17, 1954.

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who has furnished reliable information in the past substantiated the above information.

The "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications", dated May 14, 1951, prepared and released by the Committee on Un-American Activities, United States House of Representatives, Washington, D.C., contains the following concerning International Publishers:

- "1. The (Communist) Party's publishing house', headed by Alexander Trachtenberg. (Attorney General Francis Biddle, Congressional Record, September 24, 1942, p. 7686.)
- "2. 'Publishing agency of the Communist Party'. (Brief for the United States in the case of William Schneiderman, p. 145.)
- \*3. An 'official publishing house of the Communist Party in the United States,' and a medium through which 'extensive Soviet propaganda is subsidized in the United States!

  (Special Committee on Un-American Activities, Reports, January 3, 1940, p.8, and June 25, 1942, p. 18; also cited in Report, March 29, 1944, p. 76.)
- "4. 'Official American Communist Party publishing house.' (Congressional Committee on Un-American Activities, Report No. 1920, May 11, 1948, p. 80.)
- "5. An 'important publishing organization of the Communist Party' located at 381 Fourth Avenue, New York City, and headed by Alexander Trachtenberg. 'These organizations \* \* \* are among the most important institutions in the Red Fascist network. None but tested Communists and fellow travelers are permitted to participate in the management and direction of such enterprises'. (California Committee on Un-American Activities, Report, 1948, pp. 35 and 214.)





M6. One of the two chief publishers of the Communist Party and controlled by the Communists.

(Massachusetts House Committee on Un-American Activities, Report, 1938, p. 289.)

ALEXANDER TRACHTENBERG was one of the 13 Communist leaders, convicted January 21, 1953, for conspiracy to teach and advocate the violant overthrow of the United States Government.

In April, 1955, TRACHTENBERG was granted his appeal for a new trial and was released on \$5,000.00 bail.

who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on December 13, 1954, that the subject attended the National Conference to Defend the Rights of Foreign Born Americans, held on December 11 and 12, 1954, at the Yugoslav-American Home, New York City, which conference was sponsored by the American Committee for Protection of Foreign Born.

According to the informant, the subject was one of the speakers at the conference, and spoke in behalf of her husband, and characterized his arrests as persecution. She requested financial support. According to the informant, the subject also stated that she was leaving immediately for Boston to fulfill a speaking engagement for her husband.

who was a member of the CP from to advised

on January 5, 1955, that he attended
the National Conference for the Defense of Foreign Born,
held on December 11 and 12, 1954 at the Yugoslav-American
Home, Incorporated, in New York City, which was sponsored
by the American Committee for Protection of Foreign Born.

According to \_\_\_\_\_\_ the subject was one of the speakers, and that she described the case of her husband to the delegates and said, "that the Justice Department seems

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"to go out for a perpetual conviction in her husband's case, as he was just sentenced to jail for an additional 90 day sentence for contempt of court." She stated that he went to jail in defense of the people, and now she asks help of the people to defend him. She stated that the Justice Department is using legal and illegal action to keep him in jail. She proposed the following action for the delegates:

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- "1. Immediate protest to the Attorney General
- "2. Obtain the Civil Rights Congress new folder and send a greeting card to WILLIAM L. PATTERSON, and a card of protest to the Attorney General BROWNELL.
- "3. Send delegations to Attorney General BROWNELL to demand the release of WILLIAM L. PATTERSON.
- "4. Give financial support."

who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on December 10, 1954, that a dinner was to be held on December 18, 1954, at the China Village, 917 Race Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, in "Commemoration of the 163rd anniversary of the Bill of Rights", and also WILLIAM L. PATTERSON would be honored at this dinner.

According to the informant, the dinner would be sponsored by the Pennsylvania Civil Rights Congress, 312 Hardt Building, Broad Street and Columbia Avenue, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, and the subject would be one of the guests and speakers at the dinner.

and all of whom have furnished reliable information in the past, advised in December, 1954, that the subject did attend the above dinner, and was one of the featured speakers.

According to the subject stated that her husband was again in jail because he refused to give the names of Civil Rights Congress members, and she



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stated that he will be in and out of jail until he does so, unless we fight back.

advised on October 15, 1956, that a dinner was held on October 14, 1954, at the Manhattan Towers Hotel, New York City. According to the informant, the dinner was sponsored by the "New World Review", and was ostensibly in honor of PAUL ROBESON, but that it appeared to be mainly a fund raising affair for the "New World Review", and that the contributions were very large. The informant advised that the subject was one of those present on the speakers platform.



who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on January 25, 1954, that a party was given on January 9, 1954, by the Womens Committee for Equal Justice.
According to the informant, this party was a get together with the delegates from New York, who went to Atlanta, Georgia, in December on behalf of Mrs. ROSA LEE INGRAM. The subject was one of those present. The

On March 21, 1949, the "Daily Worker", an East Coast Communist daily newspaper, on page 5 column 1, reviewded that ROSA LEE INGRAM and her two sons were convicted of slaying a White farmer in Georgia, and were serving life sentences for the crime.

subject acted as Mistress of Ceremonies.





advised on May 12, 1955, that the Womens Committee for Equal Justice, to his knowledge, utilized the headquarters of the Civil Rights Congress in New York City, as its address. Subsequent to its reactivation in late 1953, the Womens Committee for Equal Justice benefited from the support of the Civil Rights Congress, as regards to personal funds and direction in accomplishing its objectives. In the informant's opinion, the Womens Committee for Equal Justice was an organization in name only, and actually operated as a sub-group of the Civil Rights Congress. The Womens Committee for Equal Justice has been directed by CP members associated with the Civil Rights Congress, and the informant was unaware of any current activity by the Womens Committee for Equal Justice.

The Womens Committee for Equal Justice, according to the "Daily Worker" of October 2, 1951, page 3, is a group that was organized to renew and strengthen the world wide demand for the unconditional pardon of Mrs. ROSA LEE INGRAM and her two sons.

The "Daily Worker" issue of October 31, 1951, page 6, columns four and five, contains an article, "Bedford-Stuyvesant Rally Honors William L. Patterson". The article reflects that Mrs. LOUISE PATTERSON was one of the speakers at the rally.

advised on November 19, 1953, that a dinner was held on November 6, 1953, at the Yugoslav-American Home, Incorporated, 405 West 41st Street, New York City, under the auspices of the Civil Rights Congress, to honor STEVE NELSON and his fellow defendants in the Pittsburgh Smith Act cases.

STEVE NELSON was tried in the United States District Court, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, and was found guilty by the jury of violation of the Smith Act of 1940, on August 20, 1953.

On August 25, 1953, NELSON and his co-defendants were sentenced to serve five years in a federal penitentiary





The "Daily Worker" issue of December 9, 1952, page 2, captioned, "Committee Formed to Defend Milgrem", the article stated that MILGRAM is a prominent figure in labor and progressive forces and at present, is the Executive Secretary of the IWO. It stated that MILGRAM is now on Ellis Island as a result of cancellation of his bail and the confinement order of the Department of Justice. The article lists LOUISE THOMPSON PATTERSON as Secretary of the organization.



who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on June 12, 1952, that the subject and her husband attended an affair sponsored by the Meterans of the Abraham Lincoln Brigade, held at 1547 North Leavitt Street, Chicago, Illinois, on April 25, 1952.

an article appearing in the "Daily Worker" issue of June 27, 1952, page 8, columns two and three, captioned,

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According to the informant, the subject stated the purpose of the meeting was to protest the jailing of the 11 CP leaders, and the Martinsville 7. The 11 Communist leaders were convicted October 14, 1949, in New York City, for violation of the Smith Act.



It is noted that the Martinsville 7 were 7 Negroes who were convicted for the crime of rape in Martinsville, Vinginia, and were sentenced to death and were electricuted in February, 1951. who has furnished reliable and information in the past, both advised that the CP and the Civil Rights Congress, and the Communist Press gave considerable publicity to this case in their efforts to free the Martinsville 7. On March 23, 1951, a pretext telephone call was made to the Council on African Affairs, by an Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, at which time, it was determined that the subject was employed by instant organization. In an article appearing in the "Daily Worker" on September 22, 1949, page 5, column 4, captioned, "Robeson To Tour Cities for African Affairs Council" b2 it is revealed that LOUISE THOMPSON PATTERSON, Director b7D Organization of the Council, will travel with ROBESON on his tour and will work with Committees in various cities towards developing local chapters of the Council on African Affairs. The "Daily Worker" issue of April 1, 1949, page 5, column three, reveals that the subject has joined the staff of the Council on African Affairs, as Director of Organization. "It was announced yesterday by the Council's Executive Committee." advised on September 30, 1947, that on September 9, 1947, LOUISE PATTERSON revealed that she had attended a meeting of the Joint Anti-Fascist Refugee Committee in Chicago, and that she was one of the principal speakers. According to PATTERSON, the purpose of this meeting was to raise funds for the Chicago Chapter for the Joint Anti-Fascist Refugee Committee. who has furnished reliable information

in the past, advised on June 25, 1946, that LOUISE PATTERSON

still serves on the Continuation Committee of the Joint Anti-Fascist Refugee Committee, and is working very hard to get the Committee started.

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advised on March 30, 1943, that the subject was very active in the formulation of the plans for organizing the National Negro Congress in the early 1930's, and contributed to the handing out of policies for the Congress in New York.

The "Daily Worker" issue of November 13, 1941, in an article datelined at Chicago, announced that LOUISE THOMPSON, member of the National Executive Board of the National Negro Congress, would leave Chicago for Washington, D.C., to attend a board meeting of the National Negro Congress.

On March 16. 19/12. information was received from
to the effect that the subject was then
a member of the Board of Trustees of the Chicago Workers
School. Also, a copy of the schedule of instructors at
the Chicago Workers School for the fall term, October 6, b7D
to December 20, 19/11, lists one LOUISE THOMPSON as an
instructor in Fundamental Principles of Communism.

The "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications", previously mentioned, contains the following concerning the Abraham Lincoln School, (Gnicago, Illinois):

listed as an instructor at the Workers School, Chicago, Illinois, on a leaflet issued by the Workers School, announcing the courses to be offered for the fall term, October 6, to December 20, 1941. The informant stated that he is positive that this woman is the wife of WILLIAM L. PATTERSON.

The records of the Bureau of Special Services, New York City Police Department, as reviewed prior to September 24, 1941, reveal that the subject was propaganda director of the League of Struggle for Negro Rights, (dates unknown).

advised prior to September 24, 1941, that the subject was a member of the National Committee for People's Rights, December, 1938.

The "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications", previously mentioned, contains the following concerning the National Committee for People's Rights:

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- "1. The National Committee for the Defense of Political Prisoners, 'substantially equivalent to International Labor Defense, legal arm of the Communist Party,' changed its name 'in January 1938 to National Committee for People's Rights \* \* \* no substantial change was made in its set-up or functions.' (Attorney General Francis Biddle, Congressional Record, September 24, 1942, p. 7686.)
- "2. Cited as a Communist front which succeeded the National Committee for the Defense of Political Prisoners. 'The organization under its new name remained entirely under the control of the Communist Party'.

- "3. Among a 'maze of organizations' which were 'spawned for the alleged purpose of defending civil liberties in general but actually intended to protect Communist subversion from any penalties under the law."

The "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications", previously mentioned, contains the following concerning the League of Women Shoppers: b2 'An organization which this committee found to be a Communist-controlled front by b7D indisputable documentary evidence obtained from the files of the Communist Party in Philadelphia. The original executive secretary of the League was Helen Kay, a Communist Party member. (Special Committee on Un-American Activities, Report, March 29, 1944, pp. 121 and 181.) "2. Cited as one of 'Communist-inspired and therefore Communist-dominated and controlled' consumer organizations whose 'chief purpose was to create mass feminine support in labor disputes'. (California Committee on Un-American Activities, Report, 1943, p. 100.) advised prior to September 24, 1941, that the subject was a member of the National Assisory Board of the International Labor Defense, and a speaker at the convention of this organization, held at Youngstown, Ohio,

On April 10, 1942, the records of the Office of Naval Intelligence, Third Naval District, New York City, reflected that the 1936-1937 annual report of the International Labor Defense, Communist Party Defense Group, lists one LOUISE THOMPSON as a member of the National Advisory Board of the International Labor Defense. advised prior to September 24, 1941, that the subject was a member of the Sponsoring Committee of the Scottsboro Defense, 112 East 19th Street, New York City, in October, 1937.

An article appearing in the "Daily Worker" issue of August 4, 1933, reveals that LOUISE THOMPSON, Secretary of the National Scottsboro Action Committee, will speak at a meeting of the Far Rockaway Branch of the International Labor Defense, August 5, 1933.

A review of the "Working Women" for June, 1933,

contains an article captioned, "And So

We Marched", by LOUISE THOMPSON, Executive Secretary,

National Scottsboro Action Committee, and a photograph
of the subject.

In regard to the Scottsboro Case, in the "New York Times" newspaper issue of May 26, 1937, in discussing pending court action in the Scottsboro Case, reflected that nine men were arrested on May 25, 1931, at Paint Rock, Alabama, near Scottsboro, and were accused of attacking two women aboard a frieght train. The original convictions, carrying death sentences for seven defendants, were set aside by the United States Supreme Court, subsequent sentences covering a period over six years, were also set aside.

The above mentioned article appearing in the "Working Women", June, 1933, refers to a march on Washington to demand the release of the Scottsboro boys, and contains the following statement:

"The National Scottsboro Action Committee, which sent out the call for the march working in cooperation with the International Labor Defense counts the march a tremendous achievement as the beginning of a broad united front campaign around these issues. The march is however, only a beginning of the intensified fight for the freedom of the Scottsboro boys".

#### E. Foreign Travel

On December 1, 1953, LOUIS ROSSER appeared before a Public Session of the House Committee on Un-American Activities in San Francisco. During his testimony, there was introduced by House Committee on Un-American Activities Counsel FRANK S. TAVENNER, JR., ROSSER exhibit Number 4, which is a Photostat of an issue of the "New York Herald Tribune" of June 14, 1932, describing the sailing of 22 Negroes to work on Soviet films. Listed in this article as one of those to sail on this trip was LOUISE THOMPSON, 435 Convent Avenue, New York City, Research Assistant of Labor Problems.

ROSSER was questioned concerning the above article, and stated that after the party arrived in Mussia, he understood that they broke up in squabbles and that only three of the original 22 remained active. One of those he named was LOUISE THOMPSON, whom he said was a Negro woman who is the Executive Secretary of the IWO.

F. Attempted Interview of the Subject
LOUISE THOMPSON PATTERSON was contacted on November 30, 1953, at Apartment 7-H. 109 Edgecomb Avenue, New York City, by SA and and at which time, the purpose of the contact was explained to the subject. When questioned concerning the formation of the National Negro Congress in 1935, the subject advised that she did not believe that she could give any information, and when asked if she would answer specific questions, she replied in the negative, and the interview was terminated.
G. Miscellaneous CP Activity
The election records reviewed on November 1, 1955, reveal that the subject registered in support of the American Labor Party in 1954, 1952, and 1951, from 409 Edgecombe Avenue, New York City.

the American Labor Party a struggle for power among three goups. These were the Communist Farty, the Socialist Party, and the Social Democrats. By the early 1940's, the Communist Party emerged as the controlling force within the American Labor Party in the major industrial areas in New York State. Generally, these were the areas around Albany, Buffalo, Jamestown, Rochester, Schenectady, Syracuse, Troy, the Hudson River Valley, Columbia, Dutchess, Massau and Westchester Counties and New York City, with the exception of Brooklyn. In 1942, the Communist Party was able to capture the American Labor Party in Brooklyn. knew this situation knew this situation b2 to continue up until at least 1949. The American b7D Labor Party never developed into an organization of any real consequence in the non-industrial areas of New York State. on May 9, 1955, advised that the Communist Party, today as in the past, through its members in key positions in the American Labor Farty, constitutes the force that controls it.


