

III. RESULTS OF INVESTIGATION

Education

Registrar, Clark University, Norcester, Massachusetts, advised that the college records disclosed that DWARD FRANKLIN FRAZIER attended Clark University from the fall of 1919 through June 14, 1920 at which time he was awarded an M.A. degree. stated the school records for this period of time were very incomplete and that she could furnish no additional information concerning the Employee. was unable to locate anyone at the University who could remember the Employee.

Employment

It is noted that Employee in his Identification and Personnel Data form indicated that he was employed with an unknown steel mill in Worcester, Massachusetts during the summer of 1921. Pertinent directories for this period were checked, but found to contain no information as to the residence and employment of the Employee at Worcester, Massachusetts.

Miscellaneous

The Portland "Press Herald", Portland, Maine daily newspaper, contained an article in its issue of November 5, 1943, announcing the Second Congress of American Soviet Friendship was to be held in New York on November 6, 7 and 8, 1945 and that Dr. E. FRANKLIN FRAZIER of Howard University was to speak on the topic of "A Negro's look at the Soviet Union"

The National Council of American-Soviet Friendship has been cited by the Attorney General of the United States as a subversive organization falling within the purview of Executive Order 9835.

E. FRANKLIN FRAZIER was a member of the Board of Officers of the Council on African Affairs as of March, 1942, and May, 1942. This informant also advised that as of August, 1945, E. FRANKLIN FRAZIER, was a council member of the Council on African Affairs.

The Council on African Affairs has been cited by the Attorney General of the United States as a subversive organization falling within the purview of Executive Order 9835.

In Volume 2, #4, fall of 1938, and in Volume 1, #4, Summer of 1937, of the quarterly magazine "Science and Society," there appeared articles which disclosed that during the fall of 1938, E. FRANKLIN FRAZIER contributed an article entieled, "Some Effects of the Depression on the Negroes in the Northern Cities," and during the Summer of 1937, contributed a book review entitled, "A Study in Cultural Conflicts" on a book entitled, "Middletown in Transition." This magazine disclosed that E. FRANKLIN FRAZIER was a contributing editor.

Special Committee on Un-American Activities in its report dated March 29, 1944, on page 96, cited "Science and Society" as a Communist publication.

The California Committee on Un-American Activities in its report dated in 1948 on page 225, cited "Science and Society" as among publications which the Committee found "to be Communist initiated and controlled, or so strongly influenced as to be in the Stalin Solar System."

Other logical Boston informants, of known reliability, who are in a position to know of some phases of Communist Party activity in the New England area, could provide no information concerning the Employee or his family.

SUGGS, now deceased. Dr. TRENT advised there was no one presently at the college who was here when the employee directed the summer school. Dr. TRENT stated, however, that he was personally acquainted with the employee while FRAZIER was Professor of Sociology at Morehouse College in 1920s. He further stated that he had also known the employee casually during the summers of 1926 and 1927 while the employee was attending the University of Chicago. Dr. TRENT advised that he had never had any reason to question the employee's loyalty to this country and that he was not aware of the fact that the employee was a member of any subversive organizations. RESULTS OF INVESTIGATION

An article appearing in the "Daily Worker" of October 16, 1944 reflects that one Dr. E. FRANKLYN FRAZIER spoke at a meeting to pay tribute to HOWARD FAST. This meeting was held under the anspices of the "Daily Worker."

The "Daily Worker" is an East Coast Communist daily newspaper. , of known reliability, advised in January of 1949 that HOWARD FAST was a member of the Communist Party. b7D The "Daily Worker" dated December 31, 1947 contained an article by JOSEPH STAROBIN in which he referred to HOWARD FAST as an American Communist. of known reliability, advised in October of 1950 that HOWARD FAST was a Communist Party member.

The Communist Party has been cited by the Attorney General as an organization coming within the purview of Executive Order 10450.

NY 138-1583 In an article appearing in the "Daily Worker" dated March 18. 1945 it was reflected that Dr. E. FRANKLIN FRAZIER, Howard University, Washington, D. C., signed a statement commending the War Department's stand on the question of rendering Communists and Communist sympathizers eligible for Army commissions. It is to be noted that the employee indicated on his Identification and Personnel Data for Employment of United States Citizens Form that he had been employed at Howard University, Washington, D. C., since 1934. An article appeared in the "Daily Worker" dated April 20, 1947 entitled "Noted Citizens Rap Attack on Communists." which reflected that more than one hundred prominent individuals called upon Congress by letter to defeat the various "exceptional and punitive measures directed against the Communist Party" and opposed all legislation that would curtail the civil rights of the Communists. The name Dr. E. FRANKLIN FRAZIER, Howard University, appears as a signer of this letter. The February 9, 1951 issue of the "Daily Worker" reflected that Professor E. FRANKLIN FRAZIER, former lecturer at Columbia University and New York School of Social Work and presently Head of the Department of Sociology at Howard University, Washington, D. C., was to lecture on "War or Peace." This lecture was to be sponsored by the National Council of the Arts, Sciences and Professions. The article entitled "Artists, Scientists Parley Urges Peace," appearing in the May 1, 1950 issue of the "Daily Worker," reflects that

one E. FRANKLYN FRAZIER was one of the officers elected to the National Council of Arts, Sciences and Professions.

The article entitled "Artists, Science Leaders Ask Rehearing For 'll'," which appeared in the June 15, 1951 issue of the "Daily Worker" showed the National Council of the Arts, Sciences and Professions endorsed the dissenting opinion in the case of the eleven Communists under the Smith Act. Endorsers of this opinion included the name of one Dr. E. FRANKLIN FRAZIER, Sociologist.

NY 138-1583 of known reliability, advised in November, 1950 that E. FRANKLIN FRAZIER was a Vice Chairman of the National Council of the Arts, Sciences and Professions, Incorporated. It is to be noted that the employee indicated on his Personnel Data Form that he was a Vice-President of the Council of Arts, Sciences and Professions. The "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications" dated May 14, 1951, prepared and released by the Committee on Un-American Activities, U. S. House of Representatives, Washington, D. C., contains the following concerning the National Council of the Arts. Sciences and Professions: "National Council of the Arts, Sciences and Professions "l. Cited as a Communist front. (Congressional Committee on Un-American Activities, Review of the Scientific and Cultural Conference for World Peace arranged by the b2 National Council of the Arts, Sciences and Professions and held in New b7D York City on March 25, 26, and 27, 1949, House Report No. 1954, April 26, 1950 (originally released April 19, 1949), p.2)." In an article appearing in the February 6, 1951 issue of the "Daily Worker" it was reflected that Dr. E. FRANKLYN FRAZIER, Howard University, Sociologist, was the Chairman of a sponsoring committee which sponsored a dinner for Dr. WILLIAM DU BOIS. , of known reliability, advised in October, 1949 that Dr. WILLIAM DU BOIS was a Communist. of known reliability, advised that he knew Dr. W.E.B. DU BOIS to be a member of the Communist Party as of 1945. On May 17, 1950 of known reliability, furnished a copy of a petition which was presented the General Assembly of the United Nations and the Commission

This petition stated that "This committee had become a spearhead of an attempt to outline the rights of individuals of freedom of speech and association. This had been abetted by the Executive Branch of the Government and acquiesced in by the courts. In this pattern of repression is a wave of deportations, the loyalty purge, the imposition of prison sentences on lawyers defending radicals and trade unionists, and the trial and conviction of eleven leaders of the Communist Party for mere advocacy and teaching of supposed revolutionary ideas, the peacetime prosecution for the entire leadership of a political party for 'sedition' in our history." The name of Dr. E. FRANKLIN FRAZIER, Washington, D. C., appeared as a signer of the above petition. of known reliability, advised in September of 1949 that Professor E. FRANKLIN FRAZIER, District of Columbia, was one of the sponsors of the National Non-Partisan Committee to Defend The b7D Rights of The Twelve Communist Leaders. of known reliability, advised that one Dr. FRANKLIN FRAZIER was on the sponsoring committee of the send-off reception to delegates to the World Peace Congress on November 10, 1950. The "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications" dated May 14, 1951, prepared and released by the Committee on Un-American Activities, U. S. House of Representatives, Washington, D. C., contains the following concerning the World Peace Congress: "World Peace Congress "l. Cited as a Communist front among the "peace' conferences" which 'have been organized under Communist initiative in various countries throughout the world as part of a campaign against the North Atlantic Defense Pact. "(Congressional Committee on Un-American Activities, Review of the Scientific and Cultural Conference for World Peace - 4 -

A review of "Science and Society" magazine for the period approximately 1936 to 1940 reflects that E. FRANKLIN FRAZIER, Head of the Department of Sociology, Howard University, Washington, D. C., signed a statement for a news release entitled "Masses," which was issued by the National Council of American-Soviet Friendship for release on b2 February 9, 1948. b7D The periodical "New Africa," official publication of the Council on African Affairs, in its September, 1943 issue, reflects that E. FRANKLYN FRAZIER was a member of the Council. It is to be noted that the employee indicated on his Personnel Data Form, previously mentioned, that he was a board member for the Council on African Affairs.
