NEWSLETTER OF THE SAN ANTONIO COMITTEE TO FRE. ANGELA DAVIS

On December 27, a group of concerned San Antonians constituted itself the San Antonio Committee to Free Angela Davis. We elected a chairman, a secretary, and a treasurer, and we have thied to define the job before us.

This job is to make the need to free Angela Davis a live proposition in San Antonio.

We are doing this because we feel that as a woman, a black, and a Communist, Angela Davis has not received fair treatment at the hands of the law.

Angela Davis first came to public notice in 1969, when she was dismissed from a professorship of philosophy at UCLA, because she was a black woman Cammunist. The California Supreme Court soon ordered her reinstatement, but the California Board of Regents again dismissed her because it disliked her off campus speeches. By this time the justice of her cause had became apparent and the UCLA Faculty Senate voted enough money to pay her salary for a year while she gave her courses at the University. But Angela Davis had become known as a militant activist, and we feel that it is her politics rather than the tenuous facts cited by the Grand Jury that were the basis of her indictment. None of the allegations of the Grand Jury were in themselves violations of the law. Rather, the actions against Angela Davis seem to have been designed to stampede her into fleeing for her life, thereby permitting the FBI to be used against her.

There is a presumption of innocence supposedly inherent in our society, which far from being extended to Angela Davis has been violated by some authorities from President Nixon on down. This young lady is being railroaded, made a scapegoat, because she is black, female, and a Communist, in order to intimidate people in our country who are fighting for the rights of black people, for peace, for the labor movement. One need be neither black, female nor communist to insist on justice and hence freedom for Angela Davis. This has been attested to by groups and pepple as diverse as the YWCA, Aretha Franklin, the NAACP, James Baldwin, Julian Bond, and Lena Horne. USH. To further this end we in San Antonio are:

- 1. circulating petitions in our streets asking for freedom for Angela Davis, and in so doing joining with a million Americans of all political faiths to protest a political repression.
- 2. manning desks at shopping centers, movies, churches, etc, to increase petition signatures. We have done this successfully at the movie "Salt of the Earth" at the Unitarian Church at the 410 Loop.
- 3. inviting a member of Angela Davis' family to speak here in San Antonio in early March.
- 4. demanding of Governor Reagan that he release Angela Davis on bond pending her actual trial.
- 5. holding weekly meetings at the American Friends Service Committee to discuss developments in the case and to publicize Angela Davis' plight.
- 6. publishing a newsletter covering latest developments in the case and in our activities.

We ask that you join with us, that you give your presence and dollars, your ideas and enthusiasm to sponsor freedom for Angela Davis.

SACTFAD, now gix weeks old, is advancing and expanding in San Antonio, helping to put before the residents of the metropolitan area details of the fight to free Angela Davis and knowledge of how to Join that fight.

Local supportors will join with a group from Austin to travel to California for four or five days at \$15.00 per person in March, there to show support at the Marin County Jail for Angela Davis. Anyone interested may drop in at one of our Monday night meetings. We are working for a visit on March 7, from a member of Angela Tavis' family, who will speak to a meeting in our community for which we would like to mobilize one to two thousand persons. This meeting will coincide in time with International Women's Day, a particularly appropriate time because it highlights Angela Davis' sisterhood with all women, and the extra burdens women have had to bear in social struggle as well as in many of the activities of daily life. We continue to pass out literature in downtown areas, most recently a political biography of Angela Davis. One of the most active current national efforts in this case involves obtaining bail for Angela Davis. The main roadblock here is likely to be Gov. Ronald Rongan, not nationally, noted for his sympathy for progressive causes, but we want to make it clear to the Governor that the money for bail is available should it be required. Aretha Franklin, somewhat better off than most of us, has already offered to put up \$250 thousand, to which our group of local citizens has firmly pledged a sizable sum.

The effort to free Angela Davis is broadly based, crossing religious, racial, economic and sex barriers. On the international scale, supporters of freedom for Angela Davis include Helena Weigel and Herta Kausinen, and appeals have come from Western Europe as well as the socialist countries. Nationally, supporters have been as diverse as James Baldwin, the NAACP, actors from the film "Z" including Simone Signoret, Yvet Hontand, Mikis Theodorakis, and the director Costa Gavras, and the National Council of Negro Wemen.

In this context it is espacially important that there is broad based local support in San Antonio for this freedom campaign. We have obtained approximately five hundred signatures so far in a compaign which doesn't have the funds to hit the mass media - radio, TV, the newspapers, and which is succeeding mainly by hard legwork, by collecting signatures in the downtown and over the weekends, when the working people and students running this campaign can afford to canvas. These five hundred algorithms include the names of Commissioner Albert Pena, Ed Holmes, Rosie Castro, GJ Sutton, Rev. C.W. Black, and Franklin Carcia. There is one more thing that is important for us as residents of South Central Texas to know. This is that Angela Davis' importance is twofold. She is important in and of herself because as a Black Woman professor she was not afraid to make known that she was a Communist, and to act militarily for other oppressed people, less fortunate than she-for which outspokenness she is now being railroaded, rather than being left alone to enjoy the academic life. But she is also important because of her outstanding personal qualities make her larger than life, at the same time as they bind her to the problems we all face. These singular qualities of Angela Davis have made her a symbol of the oppression which is faced by many other people in this country, resulting from our economic and political system. In the Rio Grande Valley, Chicano migrant farm workers face the same poverty that their brothers in California faced, prevented from bettering their lot by the conditions of their employment and by an "impartial" legal system which works against organizing a union. At Pharr Texas, Texas Rangers have callously shot at and terrorized Chicanos, and have incurred no penalties for doing so. Here in San Antonio a Black tecnager is convicted of felonious assault on a policeman despite the fact that his arms were handcuffed behind his back at the time he was supposed to have committed the assault. On the national level, Fr. Daniel Berrigan is accused of having conspired against Henry Kissinger, from his jail cell, so powerful is his influence supposed to be, although the documentary evidence of the conspiracy was the work of a paid FBI informant.

The point is that in fighting for Angela Davis one is fighting for justice and fair treatment for all these political prisoners in Texas and the rest of the US who are subjected to the "impartial operation" of our legal system. Success in freeing Angela Davis will help the cause of all political prisoners. To focus the fight on her is important, because this focuses our resources, and demands and thereby increases our chances of success. 

BLACK PANTHER PARTY (4)

A leaflet issued by the International Committee to Defend Eldridge Cleaver listed a number of black actors and writers as sponsors of this organization as of August 1969. They included OSSIE DAVIS, RUBY DEE, GODFREY CAMBRIDGE - Actor, JAMES BALDWIN - Writer, LE ROILJONES - Writer, and JULIAN MAYFIELD - Actor, Writer. ELDRIDGE CLEAVER, Minister of Information for the BPP, is a fugitive currently reported in exile. He fled the United States to avoid prosecution on an attempted murder charge. This organization's headquarters is at the San Francisco address of "Ramparts Magazine," a publication which has supported "left wing political causes in the United States."

STUDENT ANARCHIST-ANTI-VIETNAM WAR AND RELATED ACTIVITIES

Chancellor GLENN 8. DUMKE of the California State Colleges spoke before the Fifth Annual Writers Conference at USC the previous Wednesday, April 30, 1969. In part, DUMKE claimed that the news media was permiting itself to be used by campus anarchist because they make good copy. He called upon the media, particularly television, to feel a greater sense of responsibility to place the news in context; to recognize tactics when they see them and to help identify those tactics. The dissident groups know and count on the obligation of the press to print news even the unhealthy news—they generate and stage carefully to promote their own disruptive causes.

"Granted the media must cover the action in the news regardless of its origin, still, I believe that the media or segments and particularly television, because of its impact, should develop a greater sense of responsibility to place the news in context."

Dr. DUMKE noted specific instances when "rally organizers and speakers would deliberately delay the start until sufficent newsmen were present and when necessary until cameras and radio mikes were set up." Further, "in too many cases, only the arrests, and not the act by the student protesters which precipitated the arrests, was recorded in living sound for the evening news program."

Tempo also announced that JOHNNY WILLIAMS had joined the KHJ staff news department. He formerly covered special assignments for Tempo where he served as a liaison between Channel 9 and the black community. As a specialist in black affairs, WILLIAMS has appeared on the LES CRANE television show discussing Presidential reports on civil disorders. He has recently completed a scrip for a documentary film based on the story of the "Blacks in America from 1619 to 1968" which is currently under consideration for adaption by Wolper, Inc. Novelist JAMES BALDWIN will do the screenplay (A)

WILLIAMS, resident of Los Angeles for the past twenty-five years, has an extensive news background in Los Angeles television including special assignments for NBC-TV and KTTV-Channel 11. He has had a long and varied career holding posts as a disc jockey, public relations man, account executive, staff announcer, for stations KBAC and KNOB. He has taped news reports for KLAC radio on a free lance basis (A)
