The June 12, 1963 edition of the "Witter Post and Times Herald", a daily newspaper public in Washington, D. C., carried an article captioned "Freedom Riders Acclaimed in Talks to Mixed Audience in D. C. Church". This article concerned a meeting at the All Souls Unitarian Church on the evening of June 11, 1963, and states, "The author JAMES BALDWIN declared at the mass rally for Original Freedom Riders, 'What we are here to accomplish is the American Revolution'... 'The question that must be decided is: Am I a man or am I not? And if I am not, then white man, what are you'".

#### VI. MISCELLANEOUS

On January 29, 1963, NY T-8 made available a leaflet which stated that on January 31, 1963, the "Anti-Defamation League, defense arm of the Jewish Community, is conferring its 'democratic legacy' award on President KENNEDY, despite his record on civil rights, at a \$100-a-plate banquet."

The leaflet called on the reader to demonstrate on January 31, 1963, outside the Park Sheraton Hotel, Washington, D. C., where the aforementioned dinner was scheduled. This demonstration was to protest in behalf of "WILLIAM WORTHY, Boston-born correspondent for the Baltimore Afro-American (the largest Negro weekly) (who) is appealing a three-month federal sentence. He is the first and only American ever prosecuted for the 'crime' of returning to his native land 'without a passport'".

Among individuals signing this appeal to support this demonstration was JAMES BALDWIN.

WILLIAM WORTHY, JR. was convicted in the United States District Court, Southern District of Florida, Miami, Florida, on August 8, 1962, for violation of Section 1185B, Title 8, United States Code, in that he entered the United States in October, 1961, from Cuba without a valid passport.

On September 7, 1)62, WORTHY was sentenced to one year in the custody of the Attorney General, three months committed, nine months probation. WORTHY has appealed the conviction to the 5th Circuit of Appeals, New Orleans, Louisiana.

The records of the New York Secretary of State, Albany, New York, show that the certificate of incorporation of Freedomways Associates, Incorporated, was filed on March 2, 1961.

The Spring, 1963, issue of "Freedomways" is self-described as "A Quarterly Review of the Negro Freedom Movement" published by Freedomways Associates, Incorporated, 799 Broadway, New York City.

On May 24, 1961, a source advised that a report was given on "Freedomways" at a meeting of the National Board, Communist Party, USA (CPUSA), held on May 24, 1961. It was stated that the original plan called for the publication to be openly Marxist, but that it was later decided it would not be avowedly a Marxist publication. Editorials are in the hands of a mixed group of Marxists and non-Marxists. It was stated that the central purpose of "Freedomways" is to develop a theory and positive criticism of currents in the Negro movement, as well as to raise the level of understanding and discussion taking place in Negro life today and to project a socialist and pro-Soviet orientation.

On May 25, 1961, another source advised that "Freedomways" was set up for the CPUSA by James Jackson, a member of the National Committee of the CPUSA.



A confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on March 25, 1964, that attempted to contact Jack O'Dell on that date, but he was not available. She asked that he contact her in Louisville, Kentucky.

The same source advised on April 7, 1964, that on that date, a woman from Louisville, whom the source could not identify, contacted O'Dell and said that a copy of a pamphlet she had written has been given to James Baldwin. She added that this pamphlet documents the role of the House Committee on Un-American Activities (HCUA) and the Eastland Committee in stopping progress on civil rights and that she wants Baldwin to write an introduction. She indicated that Baldwin might be willing to write the introduction since he also has given his name as a sponsor for the National Committee to abolish the HCUA. She said she might get statements from Martin Luther King and Wyatt Walker, who recently made an excellent speech at a lunched given by the National Committee to Abolish the HCUA.

She also asked O'Dell to read the pamphlet because she wants his comments.

A source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that the NCAUAC changed its name on March 3, 1962, to include the word "House" in its name, thereby becoming known as the National Committee to Abeliah the House Un-American Activities Committee.

Relet enclosed copies of a mimeographed anonymous letter prepared by the Laboratory for use by the New York Office in a disruption tactic against the SWP. The New York Office had suggested this letter to bring discredit upon the Party in the Negro civil rights field, specifically through the activities of the SWP-controlled Committee To Aid The Monroe Defendants (CAMD). The letter implied that GEORGE WEISSMAN and BERTA GREEN of the SWP used the CAMD to their own advantage until they were finally repudiated by the defendants. It was written in a manner designed to direct suspicion as to its source upon the Workers World Party, a rival in the Monroe defense movement.

If any information re this mailing appears in New York files designated to receive a copy of instant letter, it should be directed to subject file, so the Bureau can be advised.

It is believed that a follow-up to this anonymous mailing may increase the effectiveness of the disruption operation. We can take advantage of the fact that GEORGE WEISSMAN reported to the Monroe police that while he was alone in the home of a Monroe Negro civil rights leader, two bandits came in and rifled a wall safe. A Xerox copy of a clipping from the Charlotte Observer of 2/27/64, outlining the story, is enclosed for information of the Bureau.

Since recipients of the first anonymous letter are familiar with the connection of the SWP's WEISSMAN with the Monroe defense, it will not be necessary to go into a detailed exposition if they are furnished copies of the clippong. Bureau authority is requested to send a Xerox copy of the Charlotte Observer article to the same individuals named above in instant letter. Bureau is also requested to authorize enclosing with the clipping, as a device to generate further suspicions, the following bit of verse:

Georgie-Porgie, down in Monroe, Found himself alone with the dough, Called the cops, and what did he say? "Bad guys came and took it away".

If approved, Bureau is requested to have the Laboratory prepare the poen, as expeditiously as possible, using the same typewriter and paper as in the first letter. The poem should

be on a mimeographed half-sheet, presumably an economy. by the putative sender.

In addition to the addressees of the first anonymous letter, another will be added for the second letter, if approved by the Bureau. This is the editor of Progressive Labor, Box 808, G.P.O., Brooklyn 1, New York. This organization was also active in Monroe and as a rival of the SWP may be interested in the material to use in attacking the Party.

The Bureau is requested to advise the New York Office as soon as possible since interest in the Monroe case becomes less as time goes by.



The first confidential source advised on May 22, 1964, that, on that date, Others and James Baldwin agreed to meet at the Actors Studio on the 17th floor of the Squibb Building at 3:50 PM. It was stated that Baldwin's lawyer would be there at 5:00 PM. (X)

On May 22, 1964, Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) observed Hunter Pitts O'Dell enter the lobby of the Squibb Building, 745 Fifth Avenue, New York City, and proceed to the elevator banks to the upper floors. Shortly thereafter, James Baldwin, the well-known Negro author, was observed entering this building and boarded an elevator to the upper floors.

It was noted that the directory of the Squibb Euilding lists office space for the Actors Studio, producer of Baldwin's play, on the 17th floor of this building.

James Arthur Baldwin is a Negro author who resides in Apartment 6A, 470 West End Avenue, Manhattan, New York.

James A. Baldwin was born August 2, 1924, in New York, New York. He is about five feet six inches, 130 pounds, brown eyes, black hair, dark complexion and has never married. Baldwin has written the following books: "Another Country," "Go Tell It On The Mountain," "Notes of a Native Son," "Giovanni's Room," and "Nobody Knows My Name.

James A. Baldwin has made veiled threats as follows: the June 3, 1963 issue of "Newsweek" magazine reported an informal discussion between Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy, James Baldwin and others. Baldwin told the Attorney General that he would not think of fighting for the United States if the United States got into a war but that he was thinking of getting guns and starting to shoot white people.

The November 6, 1963, issue of the Washington Daily News quoted Baldwin as saying - "I wonder how long we can endure. . . Stand and not fight back." "Many. . . even members of my own family" . . . "would think nothing of picking up arms tomorrow."

on June 30, 1963, the 'Miami News reported that Baldwin warmed that there are a lot of angry young people among his race and their tempers are wearing thin and that their self-control, which Negro integrationists use in their non-violence campaign for equality, is reaching the breaking point.

The "Washington Post and Times Herald dated September 27, 1963, quoted Baldwin as saying "We must make the establishment afraid of us."

The May 23, 1964 issue of the "National Guardian", page 12, contained an advertisement which announced that a Forum entitled "The Black Revolution and the White Backlash" would be held at Town Hall, 123 West 43rd Street, New York, New York, on Monday evening, June 15, 1964, at 8:00 PM. The advertisement indicated that David Susskind would be the moderator of the Forum and that participants would include Ossie Davis, Ruby Dee, Leroi Jones, Paule Marshall, James Wechsler, Lorraine Hansberry, Charles Silberman, John Oliver Killens and others. The announcement stated that the Forum was sponsored by the Association of Artists for Freedom (AAF), 15 East 40th Street, New York, New York, whose founding members included John Oliver Killens, chairman, and members:

Ossie Davis, Ruby Dee, James Baldwin, and Louis Lomax; and that Clarence B. Jones was Counsel to the organization.

The advertisement stated that tickets for the Forum were priced from \$4.00 to \$2.00 each.

A characterization of the "National Guardian" is contained in the Appendix pages attached hereto.

The June 6, 1964 issue of the "National Guardian", page 7, contained a narrative type press release concerning the Forum. This article stated that Negro artists had issued a call for immediate and candid talks to avert race riots and bloodshed during the coming summer; they cited recent stabbings, muggings, and vigilants actions which have already taken place in New York City.

"The Worker" issue of June 9, 1964, page 5, column 5, contained an item publicizing the Forum. This item advised that the Forum was sponsored by the AAF, which was formed following the bomb murder of Negro children in Birmingham, Alabama, in 1963.

"The Worker" is an east coast Communist weekly newspaper.

NY T-1 advised on June 8, 1964, that the AAF, 15 East 40th Street, New York 16, New York, issued a news release letter dated May 21, 1964, advertising the Forum to be held by that organization on June 15, 1964, at Town Hall, New York City. The letter stated that the Negro-Freedom Movement in the United States has yet to be discussed in an open public Forum; that leaders and participants in sit-ins and various other activities are searching for new and more effective roads to full equality for the American Negro, and that the Forum will discuss the question; where is the black revolt going and does the white liberal have a place in it?

"Muhammad Speaks", is the official publication of the Nation. Of Islam, (NOI), published semi-monthly at Chicago, Illinois.


The December 6, 1963 issue of "Muhammad Speaks", page 22, column 3, contained a news story which reported that noted American Negro writers and actors had formed an organization to "speak to the conscience of the American people" on freedom and dignity, and that this organization, the AAF, had been founded by James Baldwin, Ossie Davis, Ruby Dee, Louis Lomax, and John Oliver Killens.

The "Muhammad Speaks" issue of December 20, 1963, page 2, column 4, contained a news item which reported that the AAF called for Christmas contributions to divil rights organizations to make the Christmas season a "time of national shame and mourning" rather than a orgy of Christmas shopping.

A characterization of the NOI is contained in the Appendix pages attached hereto.

The June 15, 1964 issue, page 35, of "The New York Times", a daily newspaper published in New York City, reported that Ossie Davis, Negro actor, plus James Baldwin, Louis Lomax, John Killens, Negro writers and others are members of what Mr. Ossie Davis calls "a loosely formed aggregation known as the Association of Artists for Freedom. Mr. Davis stated "we meet from time to time to talk and argue". "It grew out of the Birmingham bombings. We talk of what we as artists can do, how we can express the anguish for the moral situation we find in this country, but not as civil rights pleaders."

On June 4, 1964, NY T-5 advised that the AAF, 15 East 40th Street, New York City, leased Town Hall, 123 West 43rd Street, New York City, for the evening of June 15, 1964, for a fee of \$300.00.
