"The Southern Patriot," a monthly publication, shows that it is published by the SOUTHERN CONFERENCE EDUCATIONAL FUND, INC. (SCEF).

"The Southern Patriot" was cited as an "organ" of the SOUTHERN CONFERENCE FOR HUMAN WELFARE (SCHW) by the Committee on Un-American Activities, House Report 592, on the SCHW, June 12, 1947.

The SCHW was cited as a communist front by the Committee on Un-American Activities, House Report 592, June 16, 1947.

An amendment to the charter of the SCHW changed the name of that organization to the SCEF, and listed its purpose as being to improve the educational and cultural standards of the Southern people in accordance with the highest American democratic institutions, traditions, and ideals. The amendment was dated April 26, 1946.

A source, who is familiar with some phases of Communist Party (CP) activity in the New Orleans area, advised on May 18, 1960, that during the time the SCHW was in existence, CP members were members of and worked actively in the SCHW. However, since the formation of the SCEF, rank and file CP members have not been encouraged to work in the SCEF. The source stated that the SCEF is a progressive, liberal organization, which he considers a CP front organization because it has gene along with the CP on certain issues, particularly on the racial question, and through the years, certain CP members in the New Orleans area have been assigned to work in the organization to further CP principles.

On May 18, 1960, the source advised that in the past, he has considered JAMES DOMBROWSKI, the Executive Director of the SCEF, to be a communist, if not an actual CP member, because he followed communist principles.

The source also advised on May 18, 1960, that many people who are officials and members of the SCEF, while liberal in their views, are by no means communists.

The CP-USA was designated by the Attorney General pursuant to Executive Order 10450.



AN OPEN LETTER

TO THE U. S. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

We are informed that the Committee on Un-American Activities of the House of Representatives is planning to hold hearings in Atlanta, Georgia, at an early date.

As Negroes residing in Southern states and the District of Columbia, all deeply involved in the struggle to secure full and equal rights for our people, we are very much concerned by this development.

We are acutely aware of the fact that there is at the present time a shocking amount of un-American activity in our Southern states. cite only a few examples, there are the bombings of the homes, schools, and houses of worship of not only Negroes but also of our Jewish citizens; the terror against Negroes in Dawson, Ga.; the continued refusal of boards of registrars in many Southern communities to allow Negroes to register and vote; and the activities of White Citizens Councils encouraging open defiance of the United States Supreme Court.

However, there is nothing in the record of the House Committee on Un-American Activities to indicate that, if it comes South, it will in-On the contrary, all of its activities in recent years suggest that it is much more interested in harassing and labeling as subversive any citizen who is inclined to be liberal or an

For this reason, we are alarmed at the prospect of this committee coming South to follow the lead of Senator Eastland, as well as several state investigating committees, in trying to attach the "subversive" label to any liberal white Southerner who dares to raise his voice in support of our democratic ideals.

It was recently pointed out by four Negro leaders who met with President Eisenhower that one of our great needs in the South is to build lines of communication between Negro and white Southerners. Many people in the South are seeking to do this. But if white people who support integration are labeled "subversive" by congressional committees, terror is spread among out white citizens and it becomes increasingly difficult to find white people who are willing to support our efforts for full citizenship. Southerners, white and Negro, who strive today for full democracy must work at best against tremendous odds. need the support of every agency of our Federal Government. It is unthinkable that they should instead be harassed by committees of the United States Congress.

We therefore urge you to use your influence to see that the House Committee on Un-American Activities stays out of the South - unless it can be persuaded to come to our region to help defend us against those subversives who oppose our Supreme Court, our Federal policy of civil rights for all, and our American ideals of equality and brotherhood.

AN OPEN LETTER

TO THE U. S. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

We are informed that the Committee on Un-American Activities of the House of Representatives is planning to hold hearings in Atlanta, Georgia, at an early date.

As Negroes residing in Southern states and the District of Columbia, all deeply involved in the struggle to secure full and equal rights for our people, we are very much concerned by this development.

We are acutely aware of the fact that there is at the present time a shocking amount of un-American activity in our Southern states. To cite only a few examples, there are the bombings of the homes, schools, and houses of worship of not only Negroes but also of our Jewish citizens; the terror against Negroes in Dawson, Ga.; the continued refusal of boards of registrars in many Southern communities to allow Negroes to register and vote; and the activities of White Citizens Councils encouraging open defiance of the United States Supreme Court.

However, there is nothing in the record of the House Committee on Un-American Activities to indicate that, if it comes South, it will investigate these things. On the contrary, all of its activities in recent years suggest that it is much more interested in harassing and labeling as subversive any efficient who is inclined to be liberal or an independent thinker.

For this reason, we are alarmed at the prospect of this committee coming South to follow the lead of Senator Eastland, as well as several state investigating committees, in trying to attach the "subversive" label to any liberal white Southerner who dares to raise his voice in support of our democratic ideals.

It was recently pointed out by four Negro leaders who met with President Eisenhower that one of our great needs in the South is to build lines of communication between Negro and white Southerners. Many people in the South are seeking to do this. But if white people who support integration are labeled "subversive" by congressional committees, terror is spread among out white citizens and it becomes increasingly difficult to find white people who are willing to support our efforts for full citizenship. Southerners, white and Negro, who strive today for full democracy must work at best against tremendous odds. They need the support of every agency of our Federal Government. It is unthinkable that they should instead be harassed by committees of the United States Congress.

We therefore urge you to use your influence to see that the House Committee on Un-American Activities stays out of the South - unless it can be persuaded to come to our region to help defend us against those subversives who oppose our Supreme Court, our Federal policy of civil rights for all, and our American ideals of equality and brotherhood.





TEWARD, who resides at 222 North 21st Street, Columbus, Ohio, and who is a retired teacher, advised on July 10, 1961 that he met the applicant initially around 1915, when they were both at Tuskegee Institute in Tuskegee, Alabama. He said that at that time the applicant was teaching at Tuskegee Institute and he (STEWARD) worked with EMMETT SCOTT, the secretary to BOOKER T. WASHINGTON. Mr. STEWARD stated he and the applicant were in close personal contact and were close friends at Tuskegee Institute and later at St. Paul's Normal and Industrial School at Lawrenceville, Virginia. He said he has not had close personal contact with the applicant since 1918 or 1919, but they have visited each other and they have maintained contact by correspondence. Mr. STEWARD stated he was unable to recall the last time he had seen the applicant, but it was several years ago. Mr. STEWARD stated their mutual interest in scholarly work brought the applicant and himself together. He said the applicant has written several books but he (STEWARD) has only written a few magazine articles from time to time. According to Mr. STEWARD, the applicant is a person of excellent character and reputation, and he regards him as a most loyal citizen of the United States. He said the applicant has been an upright, honest, straightforward citizen who is a very intelligent person and who has - 2 -

CI 140-1511 distinguished himself as a writer and a friend among the Negroes in the United States. He said he most certainly would recommend the applicant for a position of trust. Mr. STEWARD stated during the interview that the applicant had written two books which were well known in the United States and they were entitled "Negro in Chicago" and "Negro in the United States". The following investigation was conducted by b6 b7C SA AT WILBERFORCE, OHIO On July 11, 1961, Dr. CHARLES H. WESLEY, President, Central State College, Wilberforce, Ohio, advised he has known the applicant for approximately 40 years. He was acquainted with the applicant while he was a student at Harvard University and they were fellow professors at Howard University, Washington, D. C., for about 20 years. However, they have had only limited contact during the past six years. He considered the applicant to be of excellent character, associations, and completely loyal to the United States. He described the applicant as an independent thinker, a serious student and author, and one who was highly dependable.
