Member of Religious and Political Commission of National CP, 1947. Subject stated he is a Negro Communist in article appearing in February, 1949 issue of "Masses and Mainstream". Subject introduced by CP member as being currently with the "party" in 1955. Subject joined YCL in 1929, was active in YCL as member and leader in 1932, 1933, 1936 and 1937. Subject secretary of Committee for Freedom of Press, 1951 and attended and spoke at National Freedom of Press Conference, NYC, 3/21/52. Subject member of IWO (u)

I. BACKGROUND

A. Birth Data and Citizenship

On April 14, 1941, the Pennsylvania Motor Patrol, advised the FBI that LLOYD LOUIS BROWN was born April 3, 1913, St. Paul, Minnesota. (u)

B. Education

On April 14, 1941, the Pennsylvania Motor Patrol advised that LLOYD LOUIS BROWN received his elementary school education in St. Paul, Minnesota, and that he attended College of the City of New York from 1929 to 1933, obtaining a Bachelor of Social Science degree, having majored in history and economics, having minored in English, sociology and psychology. (u)

C. Marital Status

The records of the Marriage License Bureau, Courthouse, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, as reviewed prior to April 9, 1947, reflect in application for marriage license number S-13164, that the subject [redacted] applied for the license on May 28, 1937. The subject LLOYD BROWN, set forth that he was born at St. Paul, Minnesota, on April 3, 1913, the son of RALPH BROWN, born at St. Paul, Minnesota, and MARY JACOBS, born in Minnesota. The race of the subject and his parents was given as white. (u)

D. Residence

The records of the Passport Division, Department of State, as reviewed by SA [REDACTED] in April, 1950, reflect that on an application executed by LLOYD LOUIS DIGHT on September 22, 1933, DIGHT gave his permanent address as 313 East 13th Street, New York City.

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On April 14, 1941, the Pennsylvania Motor Patrol advised, as of that date, LLOYD LOUIS BROWN was residing at 3047 Centre Avenue, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. (u)

A pretext telephone call made to [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] on January 20, 1947, ascertained that BROWN was, at that time, residing with his family at 408 West 130th Street, New York City. (u)

A pretext telephone call made by an FBI agent on February 9, 1950, ascertained that the subject continued to reside at 408 West 130th Street, New York City. (u)

A pretext telephone call, made to LLOYD LOUIS BROWN at the offices of "Masses and Mainstream" on April 4, 1951, determined that the subject was then residing at 408 West 130th Street, New York City. (u)

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The following concerning "New Masses" is contained in the publication "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications", prepared and released by the Committee on Un-American Activities, U.S. House of Representatives, Washington, D.C., dated May 14, 1951: (u)

"Until its recent merger with Mainstream, the New Masses has been the weekly journalistic voice of the Communist Party. Its first appearance was as a monthly. As the Masses, it was suppressed by the United States Government for its subversive policies." Mainstream was launched by the Communist Party in January, 1947, dealing with the field of literature and creative arts. (u)

(California Committee on Un-American Activities, Reports, 1947, p. 160, and 1948, p. 340). (u)

On July 27, 1952, [redacted] 408 West 130th Street, New York City, advised SA [redacted] that LLOYD LOUIS BROWN, as of that date, was residing in Apartment 61A, at the above address. [redacted] (u)

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On March 28, 1956, a pretext telephone call was made to the subject, at which time, he advised he resided at 408 West 130th Street, New York City, Apartment 61A. This call was made by a Special Agent of the FBI. (u)

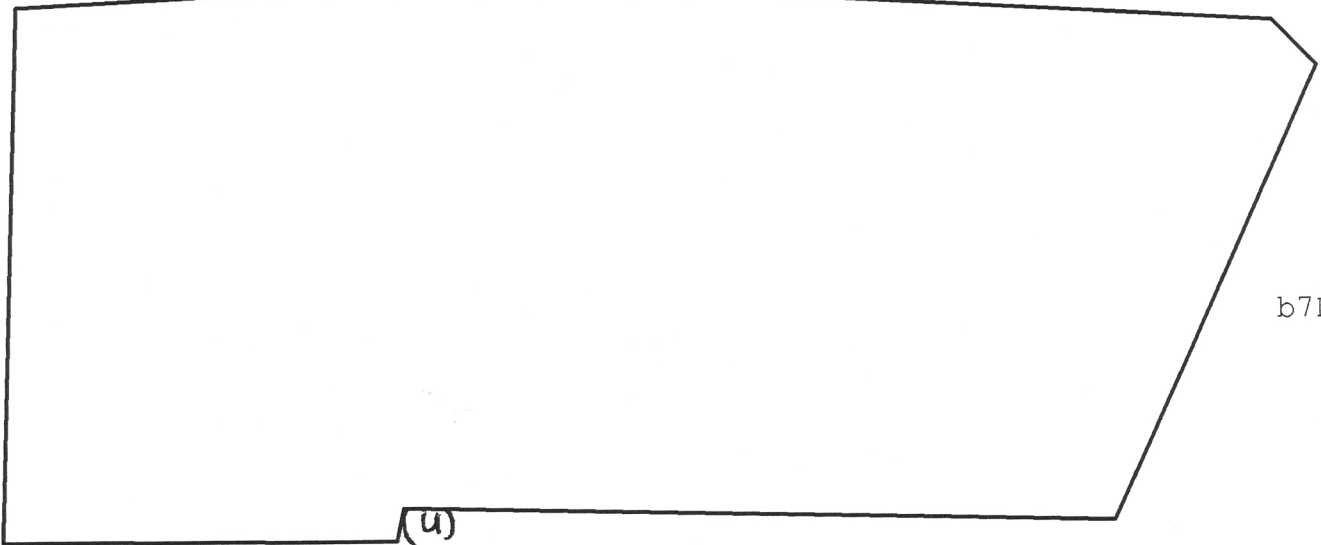
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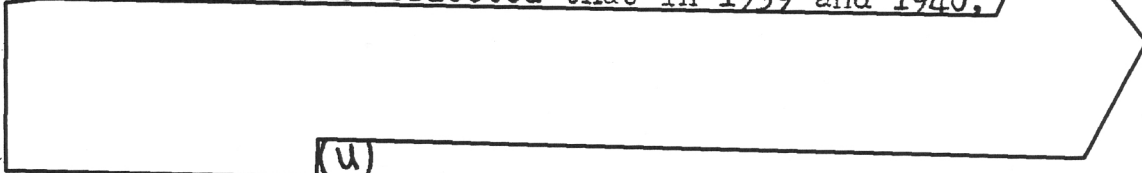

In March, 1943, [redacted] who has furnished reliable information in the past, now deceased, furnished information which reflected that in 1939 and 1940, [redacted]

"People's Voice" for April 13, 1946, page 5, column 3, carried a photograph of LLOYD BROWN with a caption stating that he had assumed the position of managing editor of "New Masses" magazine. (u)

The following concerning "People's Voice" is contained in the publication "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications", prepared and released by the Committee on Un-American Activities, U.S. House of Representatives, Washington, D.C., dated May 14, 1951: (u)

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Among publications which the committee found "to be Communist initiated and controlled, or so strongly influenced as to be in the Stalin solar system." (u)

(California Committee on Un-American Activities, Report, 1948, p. 225.) (u)

The October 5, 1946 edition of the "People's Voice", in an article entitled, "Writers Discuss Anti-Fascists", stated that LLOYD LOUIS BROWN, the editor of "New Masses" magazine, had traveled widely in Europe as a correspondent in the labor press. (u)

The October 15, 1946 and January, 1947 issues of "New Masses" listed LLOYD LOUIS BROWN as managing editor and a member of the editorial board of this publication. (u)

The "Daily Worker", in its issue of January 2, 1948, announced that a marxist cultural magazine was to be issued following the merger of "New Masses" and "Mainstream", and that the first issue would appear in March. (u)

The "Daily Worker" on page 13, in its issue of February 27, 1948, carried a photograph of the editors of "Masses and Mainstream" and identifies one of the men pictured as LLOYD L. BROWN. In the accompanying article, the subject is described as a "former labor organizer and more recently, editor of 'New Masses'". (u)

The following concerning "Mainstream" and "Masses and Mainstream" is contained in the publication "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications", prepared and released by the Committee on Un-American Activities, U.S. House of Representatives, Washington, D.C., dated May 14, 1951: (u)

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"MAINSTREAM"

A Marxist quarterly launched by the Communist Party in January, 1947 for the avowed purpose of stimulating "Marxist thinking in literature and the creative arts." It later merged with "New Masses", "weekly journalistic voice of the Communist Party." (u)

(California Committee on Un-American Activities, Reports, 1947, p. 106, and 1948, p. 340.) (u)

"MASSES AND MAINSTREAM"

"Among typical examples of the Communist press and publications." (u)

(California Committee on Un-American Activities, Report, 1948, p. 49.) (u)

LLOYD LOUIS BROWN is listed as an associate editor of "Masses and Mainstream" from the first issue, March, 1947, to September, 1953; as associate editor "on leave" from September, 1953, to December, 1954, and as a contributing editor from January, 1955 through March, 1956. During that period of time, many articles appeared in that publication under the subject's name. (u)

On April 4, 1951, a pretext telephone call was made to the subject at the offices of "Masses and Mainstream". It was determined that the subject was employed in an editorial position with "Masses and Mainstream", 832 Broadway, New York City (u)

The November, 1952 issue of "Masses and Mainstream" reflects that the subject, associate editor of "Masses and Mainstream", 832 Broadway, New York City, was on leave. (u)

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[redacted] who is in a position to furnish reliable information, advised on November 28, 1952, that the subject was on leave from "Masses and Mainstream" to write a book. (u)

A review of the records of the Credit Bureau of Greater New York, as made available by [redacted] to SE [redacted] on December 8, 1955, reflected that, according to a credit report dated September 12, 1955, LLOYD BROWN was employed as a writer from his home address, 408 West 130th Street, New York City, and formerly employed for six or seven months by the firm, Hallmark and Hubner, 52 East 19th Street, New York City, as a proofreader until February, 1955. (u)

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On March 28, 1956, a pretext telephone call was made to the subject at his residence, Apartment 61A, 408 West 130th Street, New York City, and the subject advised that he was a self-employed writer from his home address. (u)

F. Military Service

[redacted] who has furnished reliable information in the past advised in September, 1942, that the subject was inducted into the United States Army on August 25, 1942, and that his Army Serial Number was 33287993. The informant advised that the subject was also known as LLOYD LOUIS DIGHT. [redacted] also advised that subject was inducted at Fort George Meade, Maryland, and was honorably discharged December 4, 1945 at Scott Field, Illinois. (u)

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II. AFFILIATION WITH THE COMMUNIST MOVEMENT

A. CP Membership

[] who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised prior to October 9, 1942, that the subject was a member of the Speakers Committee, CP, 1938. (u)

On an unknown date prior to October 9, 1942, [] a source who compiled personnel and intelligence matters in the past, advised that the subject was a CP member early in 1941. (u)

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On an unknown date prior to October 9, 1942, [] previously mentioned, advised that the subject was a CP member early in 1941. (u)

[] further advised that the leaders of the CP were a group known as the "District Committee", and that the subject was a member of this committee in March, 1941. (u)

LLOYD LOUIS BROWN was observed by a Special Agent of the FBI to attend CP meetings and rallies on five occasions between November 8, 1941 and July 4, 1942. (u)

The "Daily Worker" of April 9, 1946, carried a half-page advertisement announcing that 300 CP clubs would hold a special meeting that week. The advertisement read in part as follows: (u)

"Hear outstanding leaders of the Communist Party speak of all branches on: the struggle for peace and rebuilding the Communist Party." (u)

LLOYD LOUIS BROWN was listed as a speaker from New York County for this event. (u)

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The September 28, 1946 edition of the "Daily Worker" announced that LLOYD BROWN, managing editor of "New Masses" would be a speaker at the first Allerton Section, CP, series of forums, speaking on "New Peoples Democracy in Eastern Europe". (u)

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On February 20, 1947, [redacted] who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that LLOYD BROWN of "New Masses" was a member of the Religious and Political Commission of the National CP, as of the above date (u)

In the February, 1949 issue of "Masses and Mainstream" there appears an article entitled, "My People and My Party" by LLOYD L. BROWN. The author states that 20 years previously, he attended a school "organized by the Young Communist League to teach Marxism-Leninism". He further stated that he has stayed with that school ever since and with the man who was the teacher in this school, GIL GREEN. He later writes, "I am only one of the thousands of Negro Communists who have taken part in the battles with our white comrades". He concludes with the statement, "The defense of the Communist Party and the precious truth it teaches----- Marxism-Leninism-----and the liberation movement of my people are one and inseparable". (u)

The Young Communist League has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450. (u)

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[REDACTED]

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On February 12, 1955, [REDACTED] who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that LLOYD LOUIS BROWN was the main speaker of the Current Events Forum of Newark at 516 Clinton Avenue, Newark, New Jersey, on February 11, 1955. BROWN was introduced by [REDACTED] who stated BROWN was currently with the "Party", and had ties in Newark over 20 years ago. BROWN left for New York after the meeting in the company of [REDACTED] (u)

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[REDACTED] previously mentioned, advised on Dec. 28, 1954, that he believed [REDACTED] to be [REDACTED] of the Current Events Forum of Newark. (u)

In 1946, [REDACTED] who has furnished reliable information in the past, identified [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] as CP members. (u)

On April 20, 1949, [REDACTED] previously mentioned, identified [REDACTED] as a CP member. (u)

On September 13, 1954, [REDACTED] who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that [REDACTED] attended a [REDACTED] meeting of the New Jersey CP on [REDACTED] at 516 Clinton Avenue, Newark, New Jersey. (u)

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B. CP Front Organizations

In the 1937 year book of the Young Communist League (YCL), the subject was listed as a District Organizer for the Western District of Pennsylvania and the following is an article describing the subject in the periodical: (u)

"Lloyd Brown, District Organizer of Western Pennsylvania, is a veteran YCL'er. In August, when the steel drive began, Lloyd went down to Pittsburgh as the representative of the National Committee of the League. Lloyd has been in the YCL longer than any other Negro member. He joined in 1929, in his native town of St. Paul, Minnesota, worked in New Haven, Youngstown, Cleveland, and New York; was also the first district organizer of New Jersey and one of a long list of editors of the "Young Worker". (u)

The following concerning the "Young Worker" is contained in the publication, "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications", prepared and released by the Committee on Un-American Activities, U.S. House of Representatives, Washington, D.C., dated May 14, 1951: (u)

A Nation-wide magazine of the Young Communist League; the magazine was later called The Young Communist Review. (u)

(Massachusetts House Committee on Un-American Activities, Report, 1938, p. 185.) (u)

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In 1946, [redacted] who has furnished reliable information in the past, now deceased, advised that in 1932, BROWN came to Harlem from New Jersey and that he was sent by the party leadership as a party representative to the YCL. The informant stated that BROWN disappeared in late 1932, and that no one knew where he went. (u)

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The October 3, 1933 issue of the "Daily Worker", in an article describing an anti-war Congress held by the CP in the St. Nicholas Arena, New York City, states in part as follows: (u)

"Lloyd Brown of the Young Communist League electrified the nearly 3,000 delegates and 2,000 spectators by his declaration that the militant youth of America will follow the path of the heroic Communist Party leader of youth, KARL LIEBKNECHT, in unyielding struggle against the war makers. Brown was one of the three youth speakers." (u)

The records of [redacted] as reviewed on March 29, 1956, by SA [redacted] reflected [redacted] (u)

"A group of 22 prominent Americans, yesterday announced the formation of a Committee For Freedom of the Press and urged the widespread organization of local groups, dedicated to the working class paper's continued existence. The secretary is LLOYD BROWN, author of the new novel 'Iron City' and the editor of the magazine, 'Masses and Mainstream'". (u)

It was announced in "The Worker", the Sunday edition of the "Daily Worker", an East Coast Communist daily newspaper, October 7, 1951, section 1, page 3, that Publishers New Press, Incorporated, 35 East 12th Street, New York City, was assuming from Freedom of the Press Incorporated, publication of the newspaper "Daily Worker" and its Sunday edition, "The Worker". Committee for the Freedom of the Press is also known as Publishers New Press, Incorporated, and Freedom of the Press, Incorporated. (u)

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On March 21, 1952, [redacted] who has furnished reliable information in the past, made available a mimeographed letter dated August 10, 1951, addressed to "Dear Friend" and signed "Sincerely, LLOYD L. BROWN (on behalf of the Preliminary Committee)". (u)

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This letter stated as follows: (u)

"We are enclosing a statement adopted by professionals at a preliminary meeting of the writers, trade unionists and artists. The purpose of the meeting was to set up a committee to organize the defense of the 'Daily Worker' and 'The Worker', to publish in the 'Face of government persecution and the current atmosphere of hysteria-----." (u)

"The Worker", issue of March 30, 1952, page 5, columns 1-3, stated that LLOYD BROWN spoke at the opening session of the National Conference for Freedom of the Press, held the previous week. (u)

On September 30, 1955, [redacted] who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that [redacted]

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[redacted] The informant stated that [redacted] has been a Communist for years and would have to be a CP member currently to hold the above position. (u)

[redacted] who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised in December, 1947, that LLOYD BROWN, born in 1913, was a member of Lodge 691, International Workers Order (IWO), as of December, 1946. (u)

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The International Workers Order has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450. (u)

On March 7, 1950, [] who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that one LLOYD BROWN was listed as one of the instructors for the "School for Writers" of the Writing and Publishing Division of the National Council of the Arts, Sciences and Professions (NCASP). (u)

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The following concerning the National Council of the Arts, Sciences and Professions is contained in the publication, "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications", prepared and released by the Committee on Un-American Activities, U.S. House of Representatives, Washington, D.C., dated May 14, 1951: (u)

Cited as a Communist front. (u)

(Congressional Committee on Un-American Activities, Review of the Scientific and Cultural Conference for World Peace arranged by the National Council of the Arts, Sciences, and Professions and held in New York City on March 25, 26, and 27, 1949, House Report No. 1954, April 26, 1950 (originally released April 19, 1949), p. 2. (u)

The "Daily Worker", November 21, 1951, page 7, columns 1-3, in an article entitled, "The Publishers' Pressure on the Negro Writer Today", reads in part as follows: (u)

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"Lloyd Brown, author of 'Iron City' and associate editor of 'Masses and Mainstream' discussed this at a recent conference on Equal Rights for Negroes in the Arts, sponsored by the NCASP. (u)

On February 1, 1954, [redacted] who has furnished reliable information in the past, furnished material which reflected that LLOYD BROWN was to participate in a [redacted] discussion at [redacted]

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[redacted] at a conference held [redacted] the New York Council of the Arts, Sciences and Professions. (u)

The "Daily Worker" of October 7, 1949, page 7, column 1, carries an announcement that LLOYD BROWN would lecture on "The Concept of Negro Culture" at the Jefferson School of Social Science, on October 9, 1949. (u)

The Jefferson School of Social Science has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450. (u)

[redacted] previously mentioned, made available on November 17, 1949, [redacted]

BENJAMIN J. DAVIS, JR. is one of the 11 members of the National Council of the CP, who was convicted on October 14, 1949, in the USDC, SDNY, for violation of the Smith Act of 1940. (u)

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The spring, 1951 catalogue of the Jefferson School of Social Science lists among the instructors and lecturers, LLOYD BROWN. (u)

The "Daily Worker", February 11, 1953, page 8, column 5, reflects that LLOYD BROWN was to speak at the Friday Cultural Forum, February 13, 1953, at the Jefferson School of Social Science, 575 Sixth Avenue, New York City. (u)

On [redacted] who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that LLOYD BROWN, author of "Iron City" was a guest speaker at a [redacted] meeting of the Metropolitan Recreation Association (MRA) held at [redacted] [redacted] MRA is also known as the Nature Friends of America. (u)

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The following concerning Nature Friends of America is contained in the publication "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications", prepared and released by the Committee on Un-American Activities, U.S. House of Representatives, Washington, D.C., dated May 14, 1951: (u)

1. Cited as subversive and Communist. (u)

(Attorney General Tom Clark, letters to Loyalty Review Board, released December 4, 1947, and September 21, 1948.) (u)

2. A "creation of the Communist Party" and "another method of recruiting Communist support by means of outdoor activities." (u)

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On August 18, 1955, [redacted] who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that LLOYD BROWN spoke at the [redacted] meeting of the MRA, held [redacted] (u)

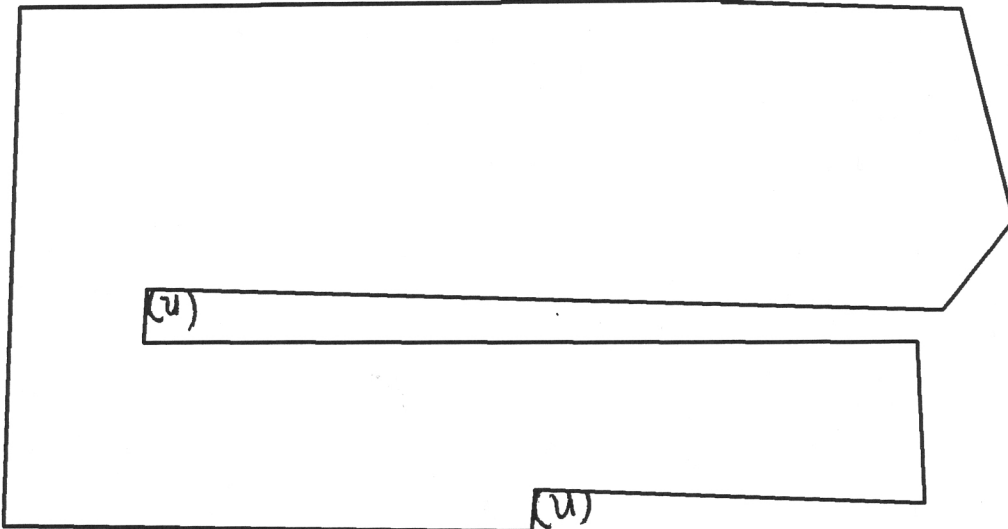

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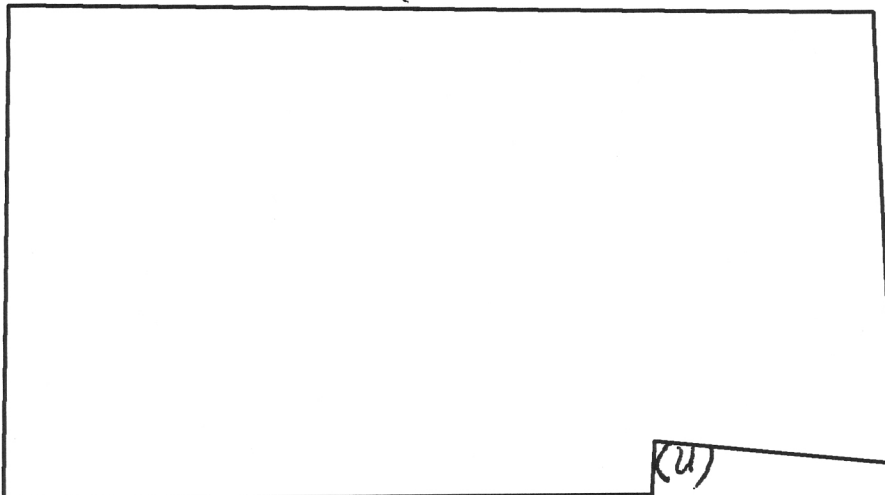
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The "Daily Worker" of August 17, 1949, page 9, column 1, reflects that the subject was among numerous New York writers who signed the statement demanding the immediate freedom of HENRY WINSTON, GILBERT GREEN, GUS HALL. (u)

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GUS HALL was convicted on October 14, 1949 in the USDC, SDNY, for violation of the Smith Act of 1940. On October 21, 1949, he was sentenced to five years imprisonment and fined \$10,000. He became a fugitive upon issuance of a bench warrant USDC, SDNY, July 2, 1951.
