While it is realized that existing instructions do not require that a report be submitted periodically on Security Index card subjects unless the subject is also a top functionary, it is felt that in view of the tense international situation at the present time, a new report should be submitted setting forth the extent of the subject's present activities in connection with the Communist Party and related groups in order that the Bureau will be in possession of current information concerning each one of those subjects who are considered a threat to the internal security. (U)

In submitting the report, the Bureau desires that you incorporate in summary form the information contained in your files not previously reported. Information of substantive nature only should be set forth and repetitious material should be avoided. Where a description of the subject has not been reported, that, too, should be included in the report and also placed on the reverse side of the Security Index card in accordance with the instructions outlined in SAC Letter No. 57, Series 1948, dated April 10, 1948. W)

In the event the subject's current address is not the same as that which appears on the Security Index card, you should correct the Security Index card and forward Form FD-119 to the Bureau in order that the Security Index card at the Bureau can be corrected.

In order that the Security Index will contain only the names of those individuals who can be considered to be a threat to the internal security of this country, the Bureau desires that you carefullly appraise this case and if it appears that the subject, based on his present position and activities or past position and activities, cannot be considered such as threat, then in addition to submitting the report, you should recommend that the Security Index

card be canceled. (U)



report of 1948, page 225, the Peoples Voice is among publications which the committee found to be Communist initiated and controlled or so strongly influenced as to be in the Stalin solar system. (U)

Review of issues of "New Masses" reflects that in the October 15, 1946 issue, LLOYD L. BROWN is listed as Managing Editor and as a member of the Editorial Board. In the January 21, 1947 issue, the subject is again listed as the Managing Editor. In the issues of February 18 and May 20, 1947 articles appear under the name LLOYD L. BROWN. (U)

The Fall 1947 issue of "Mainstream" included a short story entitled "Battle in Canaan" by LLOYD L. BROWN. On the page listing the editors and contributors, LLOYD L. BROWN is identified by "Mainstream" as "the Managing Editor of New Masses, a Negro weteran, he is at work on a series of short stories dealing with Negro troops in World War II".

According to the California Committee on Un-American Activities' report of 1947, page 106, "Mainstream is a Marxist quarterly launched by the Communist Party in January, 1947 for the avowed purpose of stimulating Marxist thinking in literature and the creative arts". (U)

Confidential Informant of known reliability, advised that the subject was employed by "New Masses" in November, 1947. (U)

The "Daily Worker" in its issue of January 2, 1948 announced that a Marxist cultural monthly magazine was to be issued following the merger of New Masses and Mainstream, and that the first issue would appear in March. The "Daily Worker", on page 13 of its issue of February 27, 1948, carries a photograph of the editors of "Masses and Mainstream" and identifies one of the men pictured as LLOYD L. BROWN. In an accompanying article the "Daily Worker" refers to the subject as "a former labor organizer and more recently Editor of New Masses". (U)

The "Daily Worker" is an East Coast Communist daily newspaper. (U)

A review of the issues of "Masses and Mainstream" reflect that the first issue is dated March, 1947. That issue and every issue thereafter, to and including the issue of February, 1950 has carried the name of LLOYD L. BROWN as an Associate Editor. The issues of April and July, 1948, of January, July and November, 1949, and of January, February, 1950 have carried contributions under the name of LLOYD L. BROWN. (U)

According to the California Committee on Un-American Activities! report of 1948, page 49. "Masses and Mainstream" is among typical examples of the Communist press and publications. (U)

Two of the articles contributed by BROWN to "Masses and Mainstream" appear to be particularly pertinent and are set out, in part, as follows: (1)

In the February, 1949 issue of "Masses and Mainstream", appears an article entitled, "My Feople and My Party" by LLOYD L. BROWN. The author states that twenty years ago he attended a school "organized by the Young Communist League to teach Marxism-Leninism". He further states that he has stayed with that school ever since and with the man who was his teacher in the school, GIL GREEN. He later writes, "I am only one of the thousands of Negro Communists who have taken part in the battles with our white comrades..." He concludes with the statement, "The defense of the Communist Party and the precious truth it teaches—Marxism-Leninism—and the liberation movement of my people are one and inseparable."

In the July, 1949 issue of "Masses and Mainstream" appears an article entitled "Their Names or Else" by LLOYD L. BROWN. Fortions of the article are quoted as follows: (N)

American democracy, to nullify the Bill of Rights, to lay the foundation for a police state...I know JOHN GATES; I have known him for many years. We grew up together in that wonderful organization, the Young Communist League... When JOHN GATES and the other Communist leaders refuse to give names of their members to the capitalist court they are but following in the best traditions of the American working class from the first 'conspiracy' trials of trade unionists until now." (U)

It is to be noted that the Young Communist League has been declared by the Attorney General to be within the purview of Executive Order 9835. (U)

The "Daily Worker" of June 13, 1950, page 11, column 1, contained an article entitled "Readers Join 'Art and Society' Discussion", followed by a statement by the editors that since the recent publication of an article by BARNARD RUBIN in the "Daily Worker" on SIDNEY TINKELSTEIN'S book Art and Society" published in 1947 and a self-critical article by FINKELSTEIN, the paper has received many latters with widely different viewpoints. Among the two letters published, was one signed by LLOYD L. BROWN, which stated in part as follows: (V)

"I am sure that a serious examination of the book will point out many errors, and help develop a better Marxist understanding by all of us on cultural questions."(U)

The "Worker", Sunday edition of the "Daily Worker" dated March 4, 1951, page 7, columns 1-3, Section 2, contained a picture of LLOYD BROWN and an article entitled "A Courageous Challenge to Corrupt Literature" with the subtitle "Masses and Mainstream to Issue Negro Writer's First Novel." The article then stated that BROWN'S book was scheduled for April release and that the subject of the book was the frame-up system, with the setting inside of a jail in the steel-making region around Pittsburgh. (W)

The article stated in part as follows:

"BROWN writes about the victims of suffering as a Marxist should write--that is, with a sense of identification on the one hand, and with the unwavering knowledge that these victims are destined to be the victors in the end. And he does this quite naturally, without any doctrinal ribs sticking out of the body of the writing. His book is a departure from

"the agonizings of that school of writers which, as Karl Marx said scornfully of certain of his contemporaries, "see in isery only misery." Item sees the faces of the future forking class rulers of our country. Even in the tiers of a Pennsylvania prison he sees these faces. They are Negro is well as white faces. (1)

"Notable is his tackling of the problem of depicting Communist characters. I will leave the analysis of this to the reviewers after the book's publication. Suffice it to say, that Lloyd Brown's work in this respect sweeps aside the grotesque pseudo-Communists foisted on us by the Ruth Mc-Kenneys and others." (U)

Jefferson School of Social Science

The above organization has been cited by the Attorney General of the United States as coming within the purview of Executive Order 9835.

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
